EXECUTIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER, COLUMNIA, April 24, 1862.

FIGURE following resolutions were adopted by the Governor and Executive Council, and were extend to be published:

The Congress of the Confederate States of America liaving passed an Act entitled "An Act to further provide for the public defence," approved April —, 1862, which authorizes the President, to call out and place in the military service of the Confederate States for three years, unless with war shall have been three years, unless the war shall have been sooner coded, all white men who are residents of the Confederate States between the ages of of the Courselerate States between the ages or eighteen (18), and thirty-five (35), except those exempt by law, the Governor and Coun-cil, as representing the authority of the State, are induced to waive, for the present, all objections to the measure, and to give it a cheerful and energetic Support upon the ground-of imperious public necessity. The operation of the Act aforesaid takes all the numerial of Armies between the ages mentioned, from the control of the State, whether

male citizens of this State, between the ages of thirty-five (35) and fifty (50) years, who shall be held for active service, wherever re-

quired by the State authorities, and be still subject to the performance of patrol and police duty until called into actice service. 3. That the second Corps shall embrace all those persons who are by law exampted from ordinary militia duty, all alien residents, and all male citizens between the ages of six-teen (16) and eighteen (18), and fifty (50) and sixty-five (65) years, who shall be held for the performance of Patrol and Police duty and for the internal defence of the State

4. That to effect the organization of the all persons embraced within the two classes specified, as well as those embraced in the said Act of Congress, specifying in each case, would also teach us patience and confidence in Himself.
