The recent decision of the Supreme Court denying the jurisdiction of Trial Justices in cases of petit larceny will, very materially, increase the expense of our Circuit Courts. All criminals of this class will now have to be tried in the Sessions Court, incurring the same expense as in cases of persons charged with more heinous offences. Besides, a person charged with petit larceny has now to be arrested, lodged in jail and fed at the expense of the county (if he cannot get bail) until the next ensuing session of the Court. All this involves additional burden to the counties. As it was before the decision, petit larceny cases were speedily tried by the Trial Justice, acquitted or condemned, at comparatively small cost. Now the office of Trial Justice is nearly that of a sinecure. We feel satisfied that this state of things will not last longer than it can be rectified by the next Legislature.
