It has been well said that there are two reasons why some people don't mind their own business—one is that they haven't any business, and the other is that they haven't any mind.

Mr. J. W. Powell has organized a small veterinary class, but, by consent, will postpone the instruction to some future day. In the meantime, any one desiring to join the class can do so.

Two gentlemen passing between Reaves Ferry and Asa Royals found thirty dollars in Confederate money and gave out word that anybody swearing to the loss and place of money when found should receive it. A certain gentleman in the community identified the place and swore to the loss of thirty dollars in current money and received for his pains the thirty dollars in Confederate money. There is a moral to this story, which is very palpable to those who carefully look.

Mr. H. Witcover, agent of the Interstate Building and Loan Association, of Columbus, Ga., was in town last week and organized an Association with over three hundred shares. The following officers were elected: C. P. Quattlebaum, President; E. R. Beaty, Secretary, and Treasurer; W. R. Lewis, D. T. McNeill, J. M. McKeithan, E. Norton and B. G. Collins, Directors. Any one desiring shares should apply to the Secretary. This Association leads money at 6 per cent approved real estate security.

A Telegram received here on Monday morning announced the pleasing intelligence that the Burroughs School, the Wine and Clerk's salary bills were safe. The first bill incorporates the Burroughs School giving to the Trustees the power to confer certain degrees upon the graduates of the School and prevents the sale of intoxicating liquors within one mile. The second bill prohibits manufacturers of domestic wines from selling wine at any place except where made; that is, a man can't make

wine on his farm and bring to Conway, or Loris, or any other place where people congregate, to sell; it must be sold where made. This is our information and the bill applies to Marlboro, Marion and Horry. The third bill gives a salary of three hundred dollars to the Clerk of Court in addition to the fees for recording, &c.

In another column will be seen the result of the election for judge board of agriculture, Clemson College trustees, &c. The election is very satisfactory. The persons elected to the different positions are, perhaps, as competent and well-fitted for the discharge of the duties of the offices to which they have been chosen as any that could have been selected, but we do think the legislature made a mistake in electing James Aldrich Judge of the 2nd Circuit. He may be as competent, may more competent than any of his competitors, but the point of objection lies against the manner of his selection.

Quite a howl is raised against President Harrison for appointing his relations to responsible and lucrative offices and yet the legislature of South Carolina allows the judge of the 2nd circuit to select his nephew as his successor, and formally and legally ratifies the selection. Judge A. P. Aldrich did not hesitate to elect one for his nephew as his successor and it seems the old man's influence was sufficient to win over a majority of the legislature. We think the legislature should have rebuked this effort of an incumbent to dictate to the legislature his successor in such severe and unmistakable terms as to forbid its repetition in the future.

JEFFERTON DAVIS spent the last year of his life in literary work. He wrote an article on Andersonville for the North American Review, exonerating the Confederate Government from the charge of wanton cruelty toward Federal prisoners. On the publication of his reply to Lord Wolsely in North American Review (which, Mr. Davis charged, was mutilated by the American editor in the interest of the English Government), Mr. Davis refused to permit the North American to publish his article on Andersonville unless the editor should agree to publish it uncut. The editor refused to give that pledge. Mr. Davis thereupon withdrew his article and transferred it to Belford's Magazine. It will appear in the January number. In the same issue Belford's will publish a brief autobiography of Mr. Davis, written a short time ago. A few weeks before his death Mr. Davis completed for the Belford Company "A Short History of the Confederate States." It will be issued at an early date.

The Growth of the South.

CHATTANOOGA, TENN., December 16.—The Tradesman has reports and estimates from the Governors and State Comptrollers of the Southern States giving their estimates of the present population of each State. These estimates are based largely on careful inquiry instituted by the State Comptrollers on behalf of the Tradesman.

The estimates are as follows: Alabama 1,658,453, increase per cent in last ten years 31; Arkansas 1,247,771, increase 55; Florida 424,896, increase 58; Georgia 2,167,541, increase 47; Kentucky 2,200,000 increase 33; Louisiana 1,251,340, increase 33; Mississippi 1,540,753, increase 36; North Carolina 1,813,024, increase 29; South Carolina 1,200,000, increase 22; Tennessee 1,800,000, increase 23; Texas 2,314,612, increase 45; Virginia 1,866,500, increase 239. Total 19,480,150, against 14,638,936 in 1880, being an increase in ten years in the South of over 35 per cent.

The Governors estimate the whites and blacks as follows: Whites 12,128,430, blacks 7,270,720. It is estimated that there are to-day in the Southern States 393,930 whites from Northern States, against 244,885 in 1880. The foreign-born whites in the South to-day are estimated by the Governors, in their reports to the Tradesman, at 643,033, against 420,871 in 1880. The white population of the South, according to these estimates, has increased a little over 3,200,000, while the colored population shows an increase in ten years of about 1,600,000.
