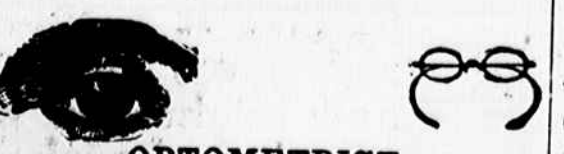

EXPORT COTTON LICENSE WAIVED

Washington.—To relieve congestion at ports the exports administrative board today waived until October 1 the requirements of port licenses for shipment of raw cotton to Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan and their colonies and to Russia.

Cotton was put on the list of commodities for which export licenses are required along with many other commodities a week ago. It was found however, that cotton was piling up faster than applications for licenses could be handled.
