

Washington-An American mis ion landed in England today on the eve of the opening of the first great war conference in which the Unite! States will participate. Col. Edward M. House, Presdient Wilson's pers n at friend and adviser is the officia'ly designated representative of the United States. He is accompanied by a staff representing every warrgency in the United States, includi. g Admiral Bencon, chief of nevel operations, and General Blies, chief of staff of the army.

Announcement by Sewetary Laussing tonight of the applicat of the party "at a British prot" released American newspapers from a pledge of silence as to the personnel of the mission and its movements. The departure of this grow of the most distinguished met in the government's war councils was a carefully guarded secret until they were safety through the submatice rme.
