## NEGRO BOY KILLED IN LOWER HORRY

Inquest Held, Henry Gibbes, Does Not Discover the Man Slayer

SHERIFF SENT AFTER, COULD DO NOTHING

Killing Probably Intended for Another Colored Man, at Same House.

The sheriff was sent for in Socastee township last week on account of the shooting of Henry Gibbes, a colored boy about 12 years of age, under peculiar circumstances.

The sheriff went but could discover no clue to the slayer. An inquest was held and they found that he came to his death at the hands of parties unknown. The jury was composed as follows: J. J. Verzen, Sam Jones, Bennie Vereen, C. C. Smith, J. L. B. Burgess, and J. A. Burgess.

The boy lived with a colored man by the name of Anderson Small. On Tuesday night some one hailed at the door of the house occupied by Small and the boy and wanted Small to come to the door so the caller could deliver him a letter that he claimed to have for him. Small would not go to the door, but he told the boy, Henry Gibbes, to tell the man to put the letter under the door. The boy took the lantern and going to the door instead of asking the man to place the letter under the door, he pulled the door open and without warning he was shot down by the unknown man outside.
