CONFIDENCE IN RUSSIA UNSHAKEN

Washington.—Premier Kerensky's warning that Russia's allies will have to bear her burden of the conflict while the war-weary nation regains its strength, exhausted in three years has aroused new expressions of confidence in Russia's future and assurances of support from the United States government and the representatives of all the Allies.

The Russian embassy made the premier's statement of Russia's position the occasion to reiterate that she has no intention of quitting the war, and the State Department, in an authorized announcement declared that in no way could the premier's statement nor any of its official advices be construed to mean that Russia seeks a separate peace.

As another mark of confidence in the Russian government, the Treasury today authorized the immediate advance of \$31,700,000 to Russia out of the credits of \$325,000,000 already authorized.

BIG SHIP PLANT FOR CHARLESTON

(Evening Post.) Advices have been received at the Chamber of Commerce from Senator Tillman to the effect that prospects for landing a big ship assembling plant here are assured, as a contract between the Southern Shipbuilding Co., of which H. N. Whittelsey is President, and government authorities, is in the process of making. Charles Kimmich, who has been kept in Washington for several weeks by the Chamber, has just returned, to announce that Senator Tillman's efforts for this city have succeeded. Mr. Kimmich has issued a statement in which he makes public the fact that Senator Tillman has "put it on."

The Southern Shipbuilding Co., claims to be able to command financial resources of seven million dollars and they will use a site near Remley's Point for their assembling plant. As has already been announced, the plan is to bring to this port fabricated steel parts from Birmingham, and assemble them for launching at Charleston. A number of 7,500-ton steel vessels will probably be assembled here before many months have passed. Mr. Kimmich states that ordinary labor can do most of the assembling work, if directed by skilled foremen. He not only gives Senator Tillman credit for putting the big deal across, but points out the hearty cooperation accorded the Senator by Congressman Whaley, and also mentions the local cooperation, in securing a site rendered by J. L. David and James Sottile. It is expected that later on ship parts will be built as well as assembled here.

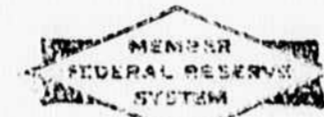

CANADIANS TAKE FORTIFIED FARMS

Make Way Over Almost Impassable Morass—Allies' Guns Superior.

Canadian Headquarters in France.—In addition to taking Meethoele and Crest farm the Canadians captured three other fortified farms on the left of their advance after encountering determined resistance from the enemy whose machine gun detachments had to be driven from concrete strongholds. The Canadians carried the positions after crossing an almost impassable morass. The wounded, who are returning from these fights, tell of innumerable heroic incidents of men facing the fire from machine guns stopping to bandage a companion's wounds or to pull men out of the treacherous water of shell holes, which threatened death to the unwary at every other step.

The enemy's artillery fire, while heavy over our whole advanced area, was erratic and scattered, our artillery with its harassing fire barrages dominating his guns. The superiority of our batteries was proved early in the engagement when the fire from the enemy artillery, which for some time shelled our guns heavily, slackened off quickly under our bombardments.

which for some time shelled our guns heavily, slackened off quickly under our bombardments. Enemy Morale Weakening. More than 100 prisoners, together with many machine guns have been taken in the latest advance. The morale of the opposing forces is surely weakening, appreciable deterioration being noticeable in the prisoners captured in the last 24 hours, compared with last week.

A visit to the prisoners' encampment today showed youngsters 19 years old. They report heavy casualties from our artillery during all of last week when our shelling and airplane observation were so good the enemy's guns had to be moved constantly from fear of being put out of action. One of the most important admissions by the prisoners is that the enemy communications are in danger of a breakdown in the Passchenlaete area. The regiments which opposed our advance were fighting on short rations.

In the case of sea island cotton the Agricultural Society of South Carolina has taken a prominent part in the campaign against the weevil, offering substantial prizes to the farmers producing the best variety of easily maturing long staple.

While there is no reason for alarm in this section of the state at this time, the cold fact remains that the boll weevil has reached striking distance and that the time for action against loss by the scourge has arrived.
