LIVES SNUFFED OUT BY HUN SUBMARINE

Washington, Feb. 10.—Eighteen hundred and thirty-two names of American soldiers rescued from the torpedoed Tuscania had been reported tonight to the war department, leaving 345 of the soldiers on board unaccounted for. No official report had reached the department to change the estimate that all except 113 of the men were saved, but 100 names have been coming in very slowly over the cables and there is no assurance as to when the list will be complete.

CONWAY RELIEVED OF MONDAY CLOSING

Local fuel administrator, John C. Spivey had a telegram from the State fuel administrator last Friday stating that the national order as to Monday closing had been modified so that it no longer applied to South Carolina. He at once notified the business men and store keepers of the town and last Monday business was going ahead here as usual.

The modification of the order taking out South Carolina from its provisions only related to a few states in the south, including D. C. State, Florida and Georgia. In this section of the country it was believed that the closing on Monday would result in very little saving of fuel owing to the warmer temperatures experienced with the North and West.
