One thing must be kept in view
when making final settlement with
Germany, and that is to make it im-
possible for Prussian War Lords

a bloody war. Germany need not
be destroyed in order to clip her
wings so she can never fly so high
again.

While the fighting men are in the
trenches and putting the Hun on the
run; every farm in this country must
be producing as much as it can.
Therefore the wisdom of the draft
regulations which aims to take what
is needed and must be had for
fighting material and yet leave suf-
ficient men at home to till the soil
and furnish the food that must be
had if soldiers are to hold out to
fight.

The rules laid down by the food
and fuel administrators have been
kept by a great majority of the peo-
ple of this country. In every com-
munity, however, are to be found the
one or two who have seemingly de-
fied these rules. The rest of the
people despise them for it, but this
does no good and they who violate
the rules every day are still going
on at it regardless of public senti-
ment. There is of course a way to
make such men and women take no-
tice, and that way is to report them
to the authorities. In some instanc-
es this has been done and the pen-
alties inflicted have been severer.
There is not a worse kind of slacker
than those who are willing to stand
and look on at the rest of the people
depriving themselves of comforts in
order to help win the war, while
they, disregarding the regulations, go
on their extravagant ways.

Fear is not among the least of the
troubles of the people just now as a
result of the spread of influenza.
The truth is that the disease is not
dangerous ordinarily. Unless it is
accompanied or followed by pneu-
monia or other serious complications
there is nothing worse to it than an
ordinary bad cold; nevertheless the
people hear all sorts of tales about
the disease, many of which are
falsities and the result is a shak-
ing fear on the part of some people
and which will make them very
much worse off in case the disease
is contracted, if indeed fear might
not in some cases result in death.
It is well enough to be careful about
the disease and walk in some dread
of contracting it; but no one should
carry the fear of it to such an ex-
tent that their chances of recovery
would be lessened.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA,
County of Horry.

Notice is hereby given that the Gen-
eral Election for State and County of-
ficers will be held at the voting pre-
cincts prescribed by law in said coun-
ty, on Tuesday November 5, 1918,
said day being Tuesday following the
first Monday, in November, as pre-
scribed by the State Constitution.

The qualification for suffrage:

Managers of election shall require
of every elector offering to vote at
any election, before allowing him to
vote, the production of his registra-
tion certificate and proof of the pay-
ment of all taxes, including poll tax,
assessed against him and collectible
during the previous year. The pro-
duction of a certificate or of the re-
ceipt of the officer authorized to col-
lect such taxes shall be conclusive
proof of the payment thereof.

Section 237, Code of 1912, as amend-
ed by Act No. 6, special session of
1914.

Section 237. There shall be three
separate and distinct ballots, as fol-
lows: One ballot for United States
Senator, Representative in Congress
and Presidential electors; and one bal-
lot for Governor, Lieutenant Gover-
nor, State officers, Circuit Solicitors,
members of the House of Representa-
tion, State Senator, county officers,
and one ballot for all Constitutional
amendments and special questions,
each of three said boxes to be appro-
priately labelled; which ballots shall
be of plain white paper and of such
width and length as to contain the
names of the officer or officers and
question or questions to be voted for
or upon, clear and even cut, without
ornament, designation, mutilation,
symbol or mark of any kind whatso-
ever, except the name or names of the
person or persons voted for and the
office to which such person or per-
sons are intended to be chosen, and
all special questions which name or
names, office or offices, question of
questions shall be written or printed
thereon in black ink; and such ballot
shall be so folded as to conceal the
name or names, question or questions
thereon, and so folded, shall be de-
posited in a box to be constructed,
kept and disposed of as herein pro-
vided by law and no ballot of any
other description in either of said
boxes shall be counted.

On all special questions the ballot
shall state the question, or questions,
and shall thereafter have the words
"Yes" and "No" inserted so that the
voter may indicate vote by striking
out one or the other of such words
on said ballot, the word not so strick-
en out to be counted.

Before the hour fixed for opening
the polls, Managers and Clerks must
take and subscribe the Constitutional
oath. The Chairman of the Board of
Managers can administer the oath to
the other members and to the Clerk a
Notary Public must administer the
oath to the Chairman. The Managers
elect their Chairman and Clerk.

Polls at each voting place must be
opened at 7 o'clock a. m. and closed
at 4 o'clock p. m., except in the City
of Charleston where they shall be
opened at 7 a. m. and closed at 6 p.
m.

The Managers have the power to
fill a vacancy, and if none of the Man-
agers attend, the citizens can appoint
from among the qualified voters, the
Managers, who, after being sworn
can conduct the election.

At the close of the election, the
Managers and Clerk must proceed
publicly open the ballot boxes and
count the ballots therein, and con-
tinue without adjournment until the
same is completed, and make a state-
ment of the result for each office and
sign the same. Within three days
thereafter, the Chairman of the
Board or some one designated by the
Board must deliver to the Commis-
sioners of Election the poll list, the
boxes containing the ballots and writ-

General Election for United States
Senator (full term) and Representa-
tives in Congress, and a Special
Election for United States Senator (short
term) will be held at the voting pre-
cincts fixed by law in the County of
Horry, on Tuesday, November 5th,
1918, said day being Tuesday follow-
ing the first Monday, as prescribed
by the State Constitution.

The qualifications for suffrage are
as follows:

Residence in State for two years
in the County one year, in the poll-
ing precinct in which the elector offers
to vote, four months, and the
payment six month before any elec-
tion of any poll tax then due and
in charge of an organized church and
teachers of public schools shall be
entitled to vote after six months' re-
sidence in the State, otherwise qual-
ified.

Registration.—Payment of all
taxes, including poll tax, assessed
and collectible during the previous
year. The production of a certifi-
cate or the receipt of the officer au-
thorized to collect such taxes shall
be conclusive proof of the payment
thereof.

Before the hour fixed for opening
the polls Managers and Clerks must
take and subscribe to the Constitu-
tional oath. The Chairman of the
Board of Managers can administer
the oath to the other Managers and
to the Clerk; a Notary Public must
administer the oath to Chairman. The
Managers elect their Chairman and
Clerk.

Polls at each voting place must
be opened at 7 o'clock a. m., and
closed at 4 o'clock p. m., except in
the City of Charleston, where they
shall open at 7 a. m., and close
at 6 p. m.

The Managers have the power to
fill a vacancy; and if none of the
Managers attend, the citizens can ap-
point from among the qualified vot-
ers Managers, who after being sworn
can conduct the election.

At the close of the election the
Managers and Clerk must proceed
publicly to open the ballot box and
count the ballots therein, and con-
tinue without adjournment until the
same is completed, and make a state-
ment of the result for each office,
and sign the same. Within three
days thereafter, the Chairman of the
Board, or some one designated by
the Board, must deliver to the Com-
missioners of Election the poll list,
the box containing the ballots and
written statements of the result of
the election.
