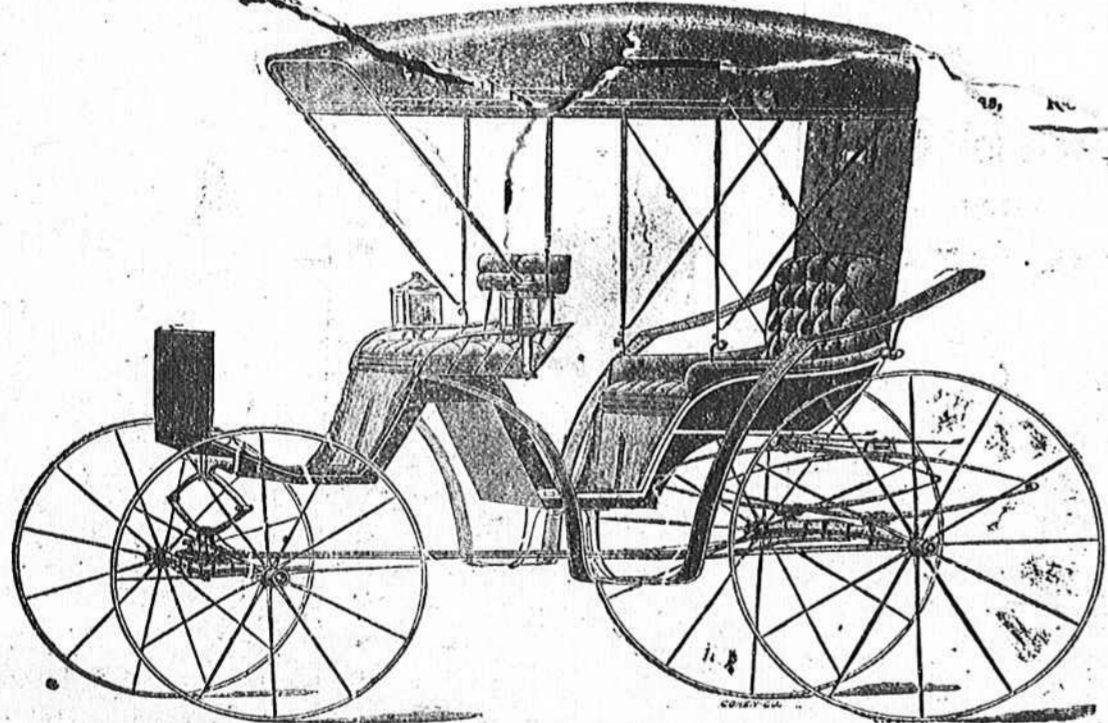

### THE NEW DISPENSARY LAW. Leading and General Features of the Revised Dispensary.

**SAVAGE DECLARATIONS AND PENAL-  
TIES—AN EVIDENT PURPOSE TO  
CHUNK UP EVERY HOLE THROUGH  
WHICH LIQUOR MAY FLOW IN OR  
MONEY MAY GET OUT—LAWS FOR  
TRANSPORTATION COMPANIES AND  
DRUGGISTS—DISPENSARIES FOR  
"DRY" COUNTIES—A SECTION AIMED  
AT SOCIAL CLUBS—RIGHTS OF  
SEARCH AND SEIZURE WITHOUT  
WARRANT PROCEEDINGS IN COM-  
TEMPT.**

The most important points of  
the new dispensary law are as fol-  
lows:

**Section 1.** That the manufac-  
ture, sale, barter or exchange, re-  
ceipt, acceptance, delivery, stor-  
ing and keeping in possession,  
within this State, of any spiritu-  
ous, malt, vinous, fermented,  
brewed (whether lager or rice beer)  
or other liquors or any compound  
or mixture thereof, by whatever  
name called or known, which con-  
tains alcohol and is used as a bev-  
erage by any person, firm or cor-  
poration; the transportation, re-  
moval, the taking from the depot  
or other place by consignee or oth-  
er person, or the payment of  
freight or express or other charges  
by any person, firm, association or  
corporation upon any spirituous,  
malt, vinous, fermented, brewed  
(whether lager, rice or other beer)  
or other liquor of any compound  
or mixture thereof, by whatever  
name called or known, which con-  
tains alcohol and is used as a bev-  
erage, except as is hereafter pro-  
vided, is hereby prohibited under  
a penalty of thirty days' imprison-  
ment or \$100 fine for each offence.  
All such liquors, except when  
brought from a State officer author-  
ized to sell the same or in posses-  
sion of one, are declared to be con-  
traband and against the morals,  
good health and safety of the State,  
and may be seized wherever found  
without warrant and turned over  
to the State commissioner.

**Section 2** constitutes the govern-  
or, attorney general and comptroll-  
er general the State board of con-  
trol.

**Section 3** provides for the ap-  
pointment by the governor of a  
State commissioner to serve two  
years, to be paid \$3,000 a year and  
to have a bookkeeper at \$1,200 a  
year and such other assistants as  
the board may decide to be neces-  
sary. It also provides for the com-  
missioner's certificates for all li-  
quor shipped and says:

And without such certificate  
any package containing liquors  
which shall be shipped out of the  
State or shipped from place to  
place within the State or deliv-  
ered to the consignee by any rail-  
road, express company or other  
common carrier, or be found in  
the possession of any common car-  
rier, shall be regarded as contra-  
band and may be seized without  
warrant for confiscation, and such  
common carrier shall be liable to  
a penalty of five hundred dollars  
for each offence, to be recovered  
against said common carrier in  
any court of competent jurisdic-  
tion by summons and complaint,  
proceedings to be instituted by  
the solicitor of any circuit with  
whom evidence may be lodged by  
any officer or citizen having knowl-  
edge or information of the viola-  
tion."

The end of this section provides  
a penalty of \$500 and one year in  
the penitentiary for counterfeit-  
ing the commissioner's certificate  
or attaching it without authori-  
ty.

**Section 4** provides for quarterly  
reports by the State commis-  
sioner.

**Section 5** forbids dispensers  
from opening packages of liquor  
shipped from the State dispensary,  
but permits them to sell malt li-  
quors in any quantity not less  
than one pint in such manner as  
they see fit, not to be drunk on the  
premises. Dispensers shall open  
their places and sell only in the  
day time under such rules as may  
be made by the State board.

**Section 6** provides for the ap-  
pointment of the county boards of  
control.

**Section 7** makes some changes  
in the requirements for a dispen-  
sary. He is to be appointed upon  
his petition and affidavit that he

has never been con-  
victed for violating the liquor laws, and is ac-  
knowledged as a respectable keep-  
er of a restaurant or place of  
public amusement, and that he is  
not addicted to the use of intox-  
icating liquors as a beverage."  
The bond is \$3,000, and is liable  
to civil action for damages caused  
by violation of the law or the dis-  
pensary rules and regulations.

**Section 8.** There may be one or  
more county dispensers appointed  
for each county, the place of busi-  
ness of each of whom shall be de-  
signated by the county board, but  
the State board must give consent  
before more than one dispenser  
can be appointed in any county;  
and when the county board desig-  
nates a locality for a dispensary,  
ten days' public notice of which  
shall be given, it shall be compe-  
tent for a majority of the voters  
of the township in which such  
dispensary is to be located to pre-  
vent its location in such township  
by signing petitions addressed to  
the county board requesting that  
no dispensary be established in  
that township, whereupon some  
other place may be designated.  
The county board may in its dis-  
cretion locate a dispensary else-  
where than in an incorporated  
town, in the counties of Beaufort  
and Horry and others. Provided,  
however, that any county, town or  
city wherein the sale of alcoholic  
liquors was prohibited by law prior  
to July 1, 1893, may secure the es-  
tablishment of a dispensary with-  
in its borders in the following  
manner: Upon petition signed by  
one-fourth the qualified voters of  
such county, town or city wishing  
a dispensary therein, being filed  
with the county commissioner or  
town or city council, respectively,  
they shall order an election sub-  
mitting the question of dispensary  
or no dispensary to the qualified  
voters of such county, town or city  
and shall prescribe the rules, reg-  
ulations, returns, ballots and no-  
tice of such election and shall de-  
clare the result; and if a majority  
of the ballots cast be found and  
declared to be for a dispensary,  
then a dispensary may be estab-  
lished in such county, town or  
city: Provided, that dispensaries  
may be established in the counties  
of Williamsburg and Marion with-  
out such election in compliance  
with the other requirements of  
this Act, and that nothing in  
this Act contained shall be so con-  
strued as to prohibit persons resi-  
dent in other counties which shall  
elect to have no dispensary from  
procuring liquors from dispensar-  
ies in other counties, or county  
dispensers from shipping same to  
their places of residence under  
proper labels or certificates.

**Section 9** contains the dispen-  
sary's oath which includes a pledge  
not to sell to any minor, intoxicate  
d person or person who is in the  
habit of becoming intoxicated. It  
also provides that the dispenser  
may at any time be removed by  
the county board of control.

**Section 10** provides the details  
of management of the country  
board of control. Members are to  
be paid \$2 a day for not more than  
thirty days in a year and five cents  
mileage. Their clerk is to be paid  
\$2 a day for not more than thirty  
days. The section ends as follows:

All profits, after paying all ex-  
penses of the county dispensary,  
shall be paid one-half to the county  
treasury and one-half to the  
municipal corporation in which it  
may be located, such settlements to  
be made quarterly: Provided, That  
if the authorities of any town or city  
which in the judgment of the State  
board of control do not enforce this  
law, the State board may withhold  
the part going to the said town or  
city and use it to pay State constables."

**Section 11** provides the method  
of buying liquor by application as  
heretofore.

**Section 12** deals with the filing  
and keeping of the blanks and ap-  
plications.

**Section 13** provides for the re-  
turns of the county dispenser to  
the county auditor, not later than  
the 10th of each month, to be made  
under oath.

**Section 14** provides for the re-  
moval of any dispenser failing to  
make his return. It also pro-

Section 16 provides that dis-  
penser shall keep an account of  
liquors sold and be allowed to  
demand.

Section 17 provides that a  
dealer or notice of a dealer of  
alcoholic liquors who places  
prima facie evidence of violation  
of the law and is found to be an  
offender to \$100 fine and other  
penalty not more than

Section 18 authorizes  
druggists to buy of their  
dispensers intoxicating liquors  
compound medicines, tinctures  
extracts which can not be used  
as beverages. Dispensers shall  
charge more than 10 per cent  
profit on such liquors. Druggists  
must keep a record of such pur-  
chases and the uses of liquor so  
purchased and make quarterly re-  
turns under oath to the county  
dispenser and county auditor. Any  
druggist bartering, selling or giv-  
ing away or otherwise disposing of  
liquors for purposes not author-  
ized by this section shall forfeit his  
license and certificate. The State  
commissioner is authorized to  
to manufacturing chemists a  
wholesale druggists alcohol by the  
barrel at cost.

Section 19 provides a fine of \$2  
for obtaining liquor by false re-  
presentations.

Section 20 makes any dispen-  
sor or clerk making false returns  
official statement guilty of per-  
jury.

Section 21 is against clubs. It  
says:

Section 21. Every person who  
shall directly or indirectly keep or  
maintain, by himself, or by asso-  
ciating or combining with others,  
or who shall in any manner aid,  
assist or abet in keeping or main-  
taining any club room or other  
place in which any intoxicating  
liquors are received or kept for use  
barter or sale as a beverage, or for  
distribution or division among the  
members of any club or associ-  
ation by any means whatever, and  
every person who shall receive,  
barter, sell, assist or abet any one  
in receiving, bartering or selling  
any alcoholic liquors so received  
or kept, shall be deemed guilty of  
a misdemeanor, and upon convic-  
tion thereof shall be punished by  
a fine not to exceed \$100 or thirty  
days imprisonment: Provided,  
That the State board of control  
shall have the power, upon a prop-  
er showing, under such rules  
as they may adopt, to exempt ho-  
tels where tourists or health-seek-  
ers resort, from being considered  
nuisances or as violating this law.
