Four mules cost, \$425.00. One road machine and plow, \$277.00. 3 tons for convicts and mules, \$163.00. Dieting and guard expenses, \$117.74. Total \$1476.74.

Poor farm expenses for 1901, including salary of Steward, burial expenses, medical attention and provisions, \$844.06.
