The Civil Rights Bill.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15th.—The most important decision rendered by the Supreme Court of the U.S. to-day was, that in the five cases, commonly known as the Civil Rights' cases, which were submitted to the Court on printed arguments about a year ago. The Court in an elaborate and carefully prepared opinion by Justice Bradley, holds that the first and second Sections of the Act of Congress, of March 1st., 1875, entizens in their Civil and Legal Rights," are unconstitutional and void, and judgments should be rendingly.
