THE DEMOCRATIC CAUCUS.

The House Democratic Caucus met to-night in the hall of the House of Representatives to nominate candidates for offices of the House. General Rosenerans called the caucus to order. Geddes, of Ohio, was selected Churman of the Cancus, Willis, of Kentucky, and Dibble, of S. C., were chosen Secretaries, and Caldwell, of Tennessee and Stocklarger, of Indiana, as Tellers. 184 members answered the roll call. "A resolution was offered by Dorsheimer, of New York, that the voting be viva voce, was adopted. At the completion of the roll call for the first ballot, 107 had voted for Carlisle, 45 for Randall, and 35 for Cox. Carfisle's nomination was made unanimous and a committee was appointed to escort him to the hall. Ex-Representative Clarke, of Missonri, was nominated for Clerk of the House on the second vote. The caucus nomination for the position of Sergeant-atarms was then conferred upon Jeh i P. Leedham, of Ohio, by acclamation. J. G. Wintersmith, of Texas, was elected Doorkeeper. Six nominations were made for Postmaster. Lyenrgus Dalton, of Indiana, present Superintendent of the Document room of the Senate, was unanimously nominated.
