

FATAL SHOOTING AFFRAY AT LAURENS C. H.—A fatal shooting affair occurred on Saturday evening about dusk at Laurens C. H., in which W. H. Pool was fatally wounded and J. W. Fowler slightly injured. It appears that on the evening mentioned Mr. Fowler, who is the uncle of Miss Eva Pool, who lives near the court house with her mother, went to the store of W. H. Pool and accused him of having been too intimate with Miss Pool. Mr. Pool, who is a distant cousin of the lady, denied the charge. Mr. Fowler insisted that he should make reparation by marriage. It is said that Mr. Fowler then remarked that there must be some settlement of the affair at once, and drawing his pistol, began firing. Mr. Pool returned the fire, wounding Mr. Fowler in both hands.

When the affair was over, it was discovered that four shots had struck Mr. Pool, one being in the abdomen, one in the leg, one in the arm and one in the side. His recovery is thought to be impossible. Mr. Pool has not been arrested. The affair has naturally created a great deal of excitement. Miss Eva Pool is a beautiful and fascinating young lady, and Mr. Pool has been visiting her for some time. As will be remembered, a suit for \$10,000 damages for seduction is now pending against Mr. Pool, Miss Martha Burdette being plaintiff.

Mr. Fowler is a resident of Laurens and for some years was a merchant of that place. He now devotes attention principally to farming. All the parties are quite well known here, and there was anxious inquiry for particulars when a private telegram to a citizen of Laurens who is visiting here was received.—Daily News.

DEATH OF N. B. FREEMAN.—Napoleon Bonaparte Freeman died Monday morning at two o'clock, aged 34 years, after an illness of about six weeks duration. He was a native of Rutherford county, N. C., and came here in 1869, being at that time employed as an overseer on the Air Line, then in process of construction. In 1870 he engaged in the liquor business, which he has carried on ever since. He was at one time street overseer, and under his direction lasting and valuable improvements were made. The deceased was a member of the Executive Committee of the Piedmont Fair Association and always used his best endeavors in promoting the advancement of the interests of that organization. He was District Deputy Grand Master, I. O. O. F., and Past Master of Mountain Lodge, No. 15, of this city. In 1875, he married to Miss Alice Pool, daughter of W. P. Pool of this city.

Mr. Freeman's business integrity, liberality and public spirit were among his principal characteristics. He was always ready to contribute generously to every deserving object, and his purse was ever open to relieve misfortune or distress. There were few public enterprises which were for Greenville's bene-

fit that did not enlist his aid and encouragement, and the loss of so useful a citizen will be generally regretted.

Mr. Freeman's death was rather unexpected, as he rode out in a buggy on Sunday in company with Newton Poole and seemed much better. He grew worse, however, on Sunday night about 11 o'clock and died Monday morning as stated.—Greenville News.
