CHANGES MADE IN STREET RAILWAY

Meeting Concerning Matter in Charlotte Yesterday Attended By Anderson Men

Hill of the Southern Public Utilities Company and the Anderson street railway company are expected to return to the city today from Charlotte, where they went Sunday afternoon to be present at a conference yesterday in regard to the Southern Public Utilities Company taking over the street railway systems owned by the Southern Power Co. This move was mentioned some weeks ago and it was therefore not much of a surprise when it became known last week that the decision had been reached.

Thirteen Thousand To Go To Work

Houghton Mich., April 13.—The strike of the copper miners in upper Michigan came to an end today as a result of a referendum vote taken yesterday among the members of the Western Federation of Miners. The strike had been in effect since last July, when 12,000 men, according to the figures of the Federation, demanded better wages and working conditions and recognition of the Federation of Miners.

President Insists On Anti Trust Bill

Washington, April 13.—Unqualified disapproval was expressed by President Wilson today of the proposal in congress to curtail the anti-trust legislative program for this session. Later, members of the House Judiciary sub committee, who had conferred with President of the subject, declared an effort would be made to report quickly a single measure, embodying the substance of all the separate tentative trust bills, and that legislation also would be pressed to meet the demands of labor for restriction of the injunction power of the courts.

THE BUBONIC PLAGUE

City of Havana is Very Much Worried Because of It

Havana, April 13.—The bubonic plague here is spreading in spite of the efforts of the Sanitary Department. One new case was reported today and two others are under surveillance. The total number of cases of bubonic plague up to date, is seven, with two under suspicion. Many blocks in the infected zone were placed under quarantine tonight, the residents being ordered to move. A majority of the poor people are being housed at the Trinitaria Immigration Camp.

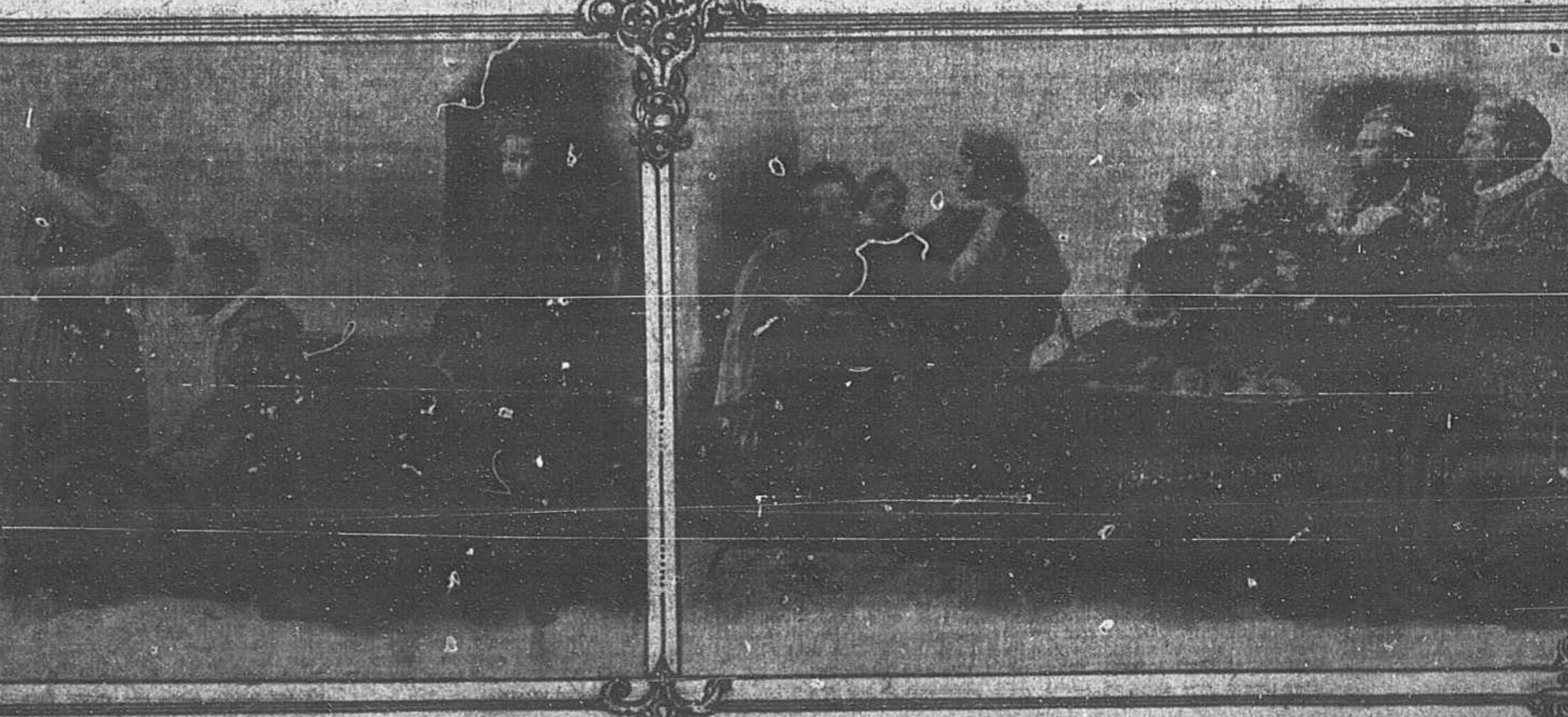
"SPREAD EAGLE BILL"
