SAYS U. S. DOLLAR MAKES BIG NOISE Senator Williams Enlivens the Mexican Discussion in Senate With a Caustic Letter

Washington, May 19.—The senate for the first time in many days of calm was enlivened today over a phase of the Mexican situation. Senator John Sharp Williams aroused his colleagues when he read a letter from "A gentleman in the government service at Vera Cruz," whose name he had torn off which among other things declared that "The boldest thing in Mexico is the American dollar."

LEVER'S COTTON BILL AGREED TO House Committee On Agriculture Puts the Stamp of Its Approval on the Measure

Washington, May 20.—The Lever bill to regulate cotton futures trading has been agreed upon by the house agricultural subcommittee and the full committee may consider it tomorrow. It provides that there shall be no tax on legitimate contracts for cotton, but imposes a prohibitive tax on what may be officially determined to be illegitimate contracts for cotton.
