## IN THE TUNING UP FOR THE AMERICAN CUP DEFENDER FIGHT

### REVIEW OF RACES

#### With a Sketch of the Big Contest To Be Pulled Off With Sir Thomas Lipton

Associated Press Boat off Greenwich, Conn., by wireless—June 6.—The Vanitie this afternoon defeated the Resolute in the fourth race between the cup defender candidates. The official finishing times were:

Vanitie 6:26:29.  
Resolute 6:32:21.

The official elapsed times:  
Vanitie 5:09:29.  
Resolute 5:15:21.

Vanitie wins by 5 minutes, 52 seconds elapsed time.

Review of the Races. New York, June 6.—With the passing of the first few tuning up tests of the trio of yachts striving for the honor of defending the American cup, for the all-summer series of races which will evolve into successful candidates to be chosen by the committee from the Resolute, Defender and Vanitie. During the coming week, the yachts will pass from Long Island Sound to the ocean course off Sandy Hook for three tests under the stern conditions over the same course which will be used in the cup races. There will follow a week devoted to repairs and changes in the yachts to be succeeded by two weeks more of Sound racing. All of these events of which there are eleven on the schedule will be of a preliminary nature. In fact they have been arranged more to get the boats in condition for the more serious tests of Newport in July and August, when the American cup committee will sit in judgment on the performances and select the best boat to meet the Shamrock IV.

The start for all the racing in the Sound will be off Great Captain Island near the entrance of the harbor of Portchester. Half a dozen courses of from 20 to 30 miles each have been laid out, some of which will carry the yachts down the Sound beyond Stamford, while others will take them well up to Execution Rock and over to the Hempstead shore. With its 120 ft. off Great Captain Island it will be possible to lay a fifteen-mile course to the windward in case the breeze is from the prevailing direction, southwest.

Eleven years ago the three cup yachts, Reliance, Constitution and Columbia, given numerous trial races in this part of the Sound, but the starts were off Long Island shore near the Matinecock Point, and it was found difficult to send the boats to the windward on the first leg.

By agreement between the managers and the regatta committee of the New York Yacht club fifteen minutes will be allowed between the starting signals for the fight for position. Two minutes will be given for the yachts to start and in that brief period each boat will be timed to the second, as she crosses the line. If she is late, her time will be taken at starting at the end of two minutes, although she may be three, five or even ten minutes behind.

The struggle for the best places at the line, the weather berth if the first leg is to the windward, a snug place away from the others with the wind in the clear if the course is to the leeward, is the supreme test of the racing master and many a race has been won or lost through success or failure at the outset.

The helmsmen of the three yachts are George M. Pynchon on the Defender, Charles F. Adams, 2nd, on the Resolute and William Dennis on the year will be in watching the game played by these cool, calculating skippers. It is a rare game—this handling of a big yacht, especially in a breeze while even in soft weather the very best of judgment is required. Each is as staid as the wheel must keep just where his own boat is, how fast she is going, where the other yachts are and how fast they are sailing. He must know when his own boat has the right to be, and when his opponent must give way and in a light breeze, not to take an inch or concede one, or the race is lost.

No fixed plan of campaign will bear the test under all conditions. With the big yachts the skipper must have help, and the assistance of a cool mate will watch and another to watch the opening yacht is of paramount importance. Forward, the mates in their men well drilled and the hauling of sheets, tacks, back stays all the light canvas require quick action and precision.

It is anticipated that in the early races of the cup yachts there may be times of seeming confusion on each one of the boats but with the notorious races and sail trials in the smooth waters of the Sound, it is expected that yachts, skippers and crews will appear at Newport on July 7 in the best possible condition and that the races of July and August will produce the best racing ever seen in American yachting competition.

# THE BULL MOOSE BEGS FOR TEDDY

## To Lead the Party in the Fight for Governorship of State of New York

New York, June 4.—Theodore Roosevelt as the progressive party candidate for governor of New York is the desire of the progressive campaign advisory committee, which met here today. After his turn from his South American explorations, Colonel Roosevelt stated he would not be a candidate.

The advisory committee, after its meeting today, issued a statement saying there was a demand for Colonel Roosevelt to be the progressive gubernatorial non-partisan and that the time had come for his party "to end the futile antagonism between the republican and democratic parties, between Murphy's Tammany and Barnes' Tammany."

Alluding to the announced candidacy of District Attorney Charles S. Whitman, for Governor on the republican ticket and the published statement that Colonel Roosevelt probably would support Mr. Whitman, the committee asserted that it approved the statement of State Chairman T. Douglas Robinson on Tuesday pointing out the impossibility of Mr. Whitman's candidacy on the progressive ticket.

# BLEASE'S PLEDGE HAS BEEN FILED

## Has Forwarded It To Washington As Is Required Under Constitutional Amendment

Washington, June 4.—Governor Blease of South Carolina reported to the senate today that he had not spent a cent or received any contributions up to date in his candidacy for the Senate. The government volunteered these promises to the people:

"I hereby pledge that I will not give, nor spend money, nor use intoxicating liquors for the purpose of obtaining or influencing votes.

"I hereby pledge myself to abide the results of such primary and to the support of the nominees of the party, state and national, and I declare that I am a Democrat and that I am not, nor will I become the candidate of any faction, either privately or publicly suggested other than the regular democratic nominee."

# WAS UNWORTHY TO KEEP MEDAL

## SO YOUNG MAN RETURNED IT TO PRESIDENT OF THE COLLEGE

### A CONTRITE SPIRIT

#### Caused Him To Make Acknowledgement of Wrong He Had Done College and Himself

Much discussion has been caused by the publication of the facts that Dr. H. N. Snyder had received from some graduate of Wofford college a contrite letter in which this person admits that he had received fraudulently a medal awarded in some college competition. He returns the medal to the college.

Stories of "conscience money" are not infrequent. Office holders who do not work and draw big salaries are never known to send any back to the treasury, but occasionally there comes the refreshing account of some heart broken person who wishes to get his conscience squared with the world.

John Austin, the man on the corner, one day this week received a letter from a person who had stolen something out of the store and wished to relieve his conscience by confession. These incidents come up almost daily, but that of the medal being returned is without parallel.

In speaking of the gold medal which was returned to him Wednesday morning by a former Wofford student, who felt that he could keep it no longer because he had won it unfairly, Dr. Henry Nelson Snyder said that instead of destroying the medal as he had at first thought of, he would obliterate from it all traces an distinguishing marks which might lead to its identification, and will in time award it if such an occasion should ever arise, to some student who shows some signal qualifications of manhood.

The student may compare with the wonderful victory the original owner won in his own soul when he returned it. This medal with the history attached to it, and symbolic of the great struggle which once went on in a man's soul and in which his finer qualities of manhood were finally victorious after the long ordeal will indeed be a source of pride.

Dr. Snyder addressed the college students in the chapel as follows:

"This morning's mail brought me a letter with a gold medal enclosed in it. It was from a former student of this college—a student who left the college before any one of you entered it. A part of the letter read as follows:

"So long as there is a weight in my soul and conscience that my work is sadly in vain, God requires me to make a confession and give up this medal, which is not rightfully mine. I do not know what to do with it. I am sending it to you to dispose of it at your discretion."

# SILLIMAN DOES JOHN LIND STUNT

## Returns From Mexico Where He Has Been Imprisoned But Is Not Talking

Norfolk, June 4.—John R. Silliman, vice consul of the United States at Saltillo, arrived here today aboard the United States naval collier Jason from Vera Cruz. The Jason brought 37 refugees from Mexico who are citizens of the United States. Some of these are without funds and Mr. Silliman was engaged today in arranging to send them to their homes in various parts of this country under orders from the state department at Washington.

Mr. Silliman declined to discuss the circumstances surrounding his arrest and imprisonment at Saltillo, Mexico. He will arrive in Washington tomorrow.

Plymouth, England, June 5.—The mayor of Plymouth and a party of distinguished persons were on board the Olympia on his arrival here today from New York to greet Colonel Theodore Roosevelt on behalf of the city.

# EMINENT AUTHORITY DEFINES "HABIT-FORMING."

Dr. Millet, late professor of chemistry at the University of Virginia, was one of the great scientists that America has ever produced. He received his Ph. D. degree from the University of Göttingen; his M. D. from the State University of Louisiana; his LL. D. from Princeton, John Hopkins, and the University of Pennsylvania. He was honored with the title of Fellow of the Royal Society.

At various times he occupied the chair of chemistry at the University of Alabama, University of Texas, Tulane University, Jefferson Medical College and the University of Virginia, occupying the latter position for nearly forty years.

Testifying as an expert before the Federal Court, Dr. Millet discussed the coffee containing beverages (coffee, tea, Coca-Cola, etc.) and showed that his analysis showed that Coca-Cola contains less caffeine than either tea or coffee as ordinarily prepared. He stated further that the use of caffeine or beverages containing caffeine in moderation, is not only not harmful but absolutely beneficial. Dr. Millet explained why caffeine was not a habit-forming substance, and gave the following scientific explanation: "In the first place I think that the habit formed must be a detrimental one and an injurious one, one that becomes so firmly fixed upon a person acquiring it that it is thrown off with great difficulty and with considerable suffering, and in a third place, that the continued exercise of the habit increases the demand for the habit-forming drug."

# Savings Bank Deposits.

(From The Wall Street Journal.) "Never in my experience have I had to inform so many persons of the limit of deposits on which we pay interest," said the receiving teller of one of the largest savings banks in New York. "In the last few weeks several dozen accounts reached the \$1,000 limit and some of them were started comparatively short time ago. New accounts are increasing in number every week. Thrift among all classes seems to have increased tremendously during the past year."

# NO PANICS NOW SAYS MR. McADOO

## The Organization of the Federal Reserve Bank Will Bring Prosperity to the Country

Washington, June 4.—Secretary McAdoo gave out a statement during the day in which he said the organization of the federal reserve banks had proceeded rapidly and satisfactorily and was ahead of the schedule mapped out. "I am highly pleased with the help the banks have given the organization committee in this initial work," he said. "There is a general recognition of the value of the federal reserve act and of the great advantages that will come to the general business of the country from it."

"It is pleasing also to note that the annual scare of tight or insufficient money money to move the crops has not appeared this year. There will be no difficulty about providing all the money that may be required to move the crops this fall no matter how big or record breaking they may be."

## County Chairman Now Ready To Furnish All Secretaries With Proper Books For Lists

The county chairman has requested that every secretary call as soon as may be convenient and get the rolls for his precinct in order that the work may start.
