lally of Anderson from being present. Dodging No Issues.

John G. Richards of Liberty Hill, promised a safe and progressive administration and asserted that he never had in his long official life dodged an issue. He said that he was the author of a bill creating 124 free scholarships for young men at Winthrop college, among other bills of which he is the author and which became laws. He explained his change from a state wide prohibitionist to a local optionist. He favored educational advancement along all lines. "I am not swinging to anyone," he declared. He answered in reply to a question that he favored the minority report of the recent democratic state convention as regards registration.

Charles Carroll Simms, of Barnwell made a brief speech and announced the death of a sister at Charleston during the day. He asserted that he was shocked to know the state convention had treated the "poor white voter" with the medicine given the negro in 1876.

Lieutenant Governor Charles A. Smith, of Timmonsville, stated his aim was to make the state a better and happier place in which to live. He made his appeal for support on his record as lieutenant governor. He urged an economical administration, a two cent rate law expecting on the short lines and a popular vote of state wide prohibition.

Speaker Mendel L. Smith of Camden read of his record in the house of representatives and advocated a two cent rate law for the trunk lines and a full crew statute. Approving the good roads movement, he urged working convicts on the roads. He asserted he stood for the strict enforcement of the law and for an option compulsory education. He deplored ill-considered grants of pardons. After being in session since eleven o'clock, with an hour and a half for dinner, the meeting closed at six o'clock.

**Would Limit Money.**

Washington, June 17.—The Rucker bill to codify and amend various laws relating to publicity of political campaign contributions and expenses, was debated without action in the house today. It will be brought up for passage Wednesday. A new section of the proposed law would limit the amount of money which national political committees or organizations which in two or more states shall attempt to influence election of senators or representatives, may use or expend for campaign purposes in any state, "to the aggregate amount contributed to the committee by the actual residents of the state," except for expenses of campaign speakers, for printing and distributing literature and for newspaper advertisements.

**Tobacco Men Meet.**

Louisville, Ky., June 17.—Delegates attending the Tobacco Association of the United States convention in session here today attended a sale at the break in Louisville held especially for them. Attempts are being made to have the association inaugurate a campaign to secure a reduction in tobacco taxes in this and other countries. Y. M. Carrington, of Richmond, Va., president of the association, probably will be reelected tomorrow.

**Fine to Accept Money.**

Tampico, June 16, Via Laredo, Tex. June 17.—Governor Caballera has issued a decree fixing a fine of 500 to 1,000 pesos upon all persons offering or receiving Federal bills dated after February 22, 1913. As those bills constitute a part of the money in circulation, the decree will likely have grave consequences to business of all kinds. Merchants already are embarrassed because of shortage of currency.

### Breach Mended Between Chiefs

my. "Come with us or remain away, as you choose," was said to be the purport of the message.

It was reported in Saltillo, that in following out the plan, two brigades already have left Torreon for Saltillo, to operate under Villa, who was expected to leave Wednesday.

El Paso, Texas, June 17.—General Venustiano Carranza and General Francisco Villa tonight failed to deny that their relations had reached a breaking point. Neither did agents of the constitutional leader or his field commander attempt to give reasons for the ousting yesterday by Villa supporters of all Carranza appointees in the offices at Juarez.

A statement issued early today by a Villa agent here, said Villa had authorized the agent to issue a general denial of the reported estrangement. The statement was found later to have been made without authority.

Flowers of both Villa and Carranza were unable today to get an official expression from Coahuila, where Carranza has established himself, or from Torreon, where Villa evidently remained.

Employees of the Juarez customs house and telegraph office were sent south today on a special train. They were reported as having been placed by Villa's officers in the State penitentiary at Chihuahua.

However, according to Roberto Pequeira, Carranza's confidential agent here, the men were sent to Saltillo, Carranza's headquarters. This report was received by agents of both factions as a sarcastic action by the Villa adherents. It was not denied from any source that Villa's soldiers had taken over the entire fabric of civil government that heretofore was manipulated by Carranza's cabinet officers.

H. Perez, Abreu, in charge of the constitutionalists in formation bureau, disappeared with the real Alberto Pani, Carranza's agent in charge of the treasury department at Juarez, escaped to American soil, although all of his fellow employees were arrested.

**Much Money Gone.**

In addition to the disappearance of the Carranza officials from the border port \$100,000 in constitutionalist currency missing, it is said tonight. The money was said to have been confiscated by Villa and taken to Chihuahua.

Lazaro de La Carza, Villa's commercial agent at Juarez, today issued an invitation for the Spaniards of the La Guna district to return to their homes. They had been forced to leave Mexico by Villa's order, just after the taking of Torreon. de La Carza's statement said:

"The order from General Villa expelling the Spaniards from Torreon was made necessary in view of the profound hostile sentiment against them among the people. Now the conditions are normal in that region and the Spaniards may return to their homes with full guarantees."

Reports today indicated that the election of Carranza officials at Juarez last night was followed by similar events at other points in Northern Mexico. Agents of both factions denied in general terms there had been any estrangement, but Villa's men sat in chairs which yesterday were occupied by Carranza's officers at the customs house, telegraph and federal offices at Juarez.

One of Carranza's representatives declared, similar transfers had occurred at Chihuahua, Torreon and other cities. The doubly enforced censorship, prevented specific news arriving from the south regarding the sudden turn of affairs in Northern Mexico, or of the military movements against Zacatecas.

Villa ordered by Carranza to move south, remained at Torreon, although it was thought his troops had been put in motion.

Saltillo, Mex., June 16.—Via Laredo, Tex., June 17.—General Villa's resignation as commander of the constitutionalist army of the central division has not been accepted and the threatened breach between General Villa and General Carranza has been averted according to a statement from General Carranza's headquarters late today.

It was reiterated, that representations of the strained relations between Generals Villa and Carranza had been greatly exaggerated and that Villa would go immediately to Zacatecas to direct the assault on that town.

It was announced that the campaign against Zacatecas would be pushed at once, that five thousand men had left Torreon for Zacatecas yesterday and that 3,000 more would leave today. It is understood that the assault on the strong position at Zacatecas will begin tomorrow and the town be carried by assault.

## NIAGARA FALLS IS PESSIMISTIC

### MEDIATION ALMOST A CONFESSED FAILURE

### REBELS STUBBORN

### Conferences May End Friday as Mexican Internal Troubles Are Beyond Reach.

(By Associated Press)

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 16.—Justice Lamar and Frederick W. Lehmann, the American delegates to the mediation conference, went to Buffalo today and talked for four hours with Rafael Zubaran and Luis Cabrera, personal representatives of General Carranza. Their purpose was to find some way to bring the constitutionalists in harmony with the scope of mediation. The mission was a failure.

The constitutionalists' representatives who had come from Washington especially to see the American delegates, told them why they could not agree to a mediation, why only a man prominent in the constitutionalist ranks could be accepted by them for the provisional presidency, and finally they said they believed the constitutionalist army would settle the Mexican problem soon if left unhampered by foreign complications.

The Americans returned to Niagara Falls feeling that so far as the political pacification of Mexico is concerned mediation had accomplished nothing and probably the end of the conferences was very near.

The next full conference is set for Friday. Until then little will be done because of the absence of Minister Noan, of Argentina.

Most of the principals here incline to the view that Friday's session may be the last. The three mediating plenipotentiaries virtually have abandoned hope of solving Mexico's internal problems. The Huerta delegates are resolute in their determination not to accept a constitutionalist partisan and there appears no feasible way of keeping all elements in conference much longer. Only developments not now foreseen, such as a change of attitude on the part of the constitutionalists or of the Huerta delegates can keep the conference in session.

Dispatches of the forcible seizure by a Villa official of the telegraph office at Juarez, held previously by Carranza officials, created a stir in the mediation colony. The Huerta delegates said it plainly showed the correctness of their repeated warnings that a lack of cohesion in the constitutionalist ranks would lead to anarchy in the north. The news served also to confirm suspicions current in many quarters here of breach between Villa and Carranza.

Incidentally it is understood the American delegates inquired of Cabrera and Zubaran what they thought of the stories to a split between Villa and Carranza. The constitutionalist emissaries said they had confidence in General Carranza's tact and ability to smooth over such difficulties.

The gravest apprehension, nevertheless, is felt here of what may follow a break between Carranza and Villa. Should their forces clash, a condition of anarchy might ensue which in all probability would arouse again demands for armed intervention by the United States.

The mediators hold to the opinion that they have accomplished something, in that war between the United States and the Huerta government was halted by mediation.

General Huerta's withdrawal from the presidency is expected soon as a matter of course, regardless of the outcome of mediation. It is believed a successor to Huerta will be chosen at elections in Federal territory next month.

If the mediation conference adjourns, it is all probability, will acknowledge its failure to bring the rival elements together for a solution of the internal problem, but at the same time probably will announce the solution of Mexico's international conflict. Just what disposition will be made of the American forces at Vera Cruz no one here is in a position to conjecture.

### Pessimism Prevails.

The atmosphere here is wholly pessimistic. The American delegates declined to discuss in detail, their trip to Buffalo. Mr. Lehmann made a special trip across the river to get newspaper men not to treat the trip of the American commissioners to Buffalo in a light vein. He assured them the situation was serious. Justice Lamar stated the following statement:

"For sometime we have been trying to get into communication with the constitutionalists. They did not feel they could enter. The circumstances come to Niagara Falls, but they were too anxious to retreat and suggested Buffalo. With the approval of Washington we waived all formalities and went to see them. We met Rafael Zubaran and Luis Cabrera, the authorized representatives of General Carranza. We had previously informed the mediators of our plans."

The American delegates and the two Mexicans conferred all afternoon. The decision was made shortly before 7 o'clock when Zubaran and Cabrera left for Washington. When the American delegates returned here they telephoned Secretary Bryan. Later Mr. Lehmann communicated the results of their trip to the mediators.

Justice Lamar and Mr. Lehmann had gone to Buffalo not only in the hope of arranging some practical way of negotiating with the constitutionalists while the mediation was in progress, but of getting names of suitable men for provisional president as well as

general information about the constitutionalist cause.

Armies impossible. The constitutionalists made clear first of all that the condition imposed by the mediators—the declaration of an armistice—was an impossible one for them to fill in advance of some definite agreement on a peace plan. Mr. Cabrera said that if the constitutionalist army were forced to stop fighting it would disintegrate.

Leaving the question of an armistice, both Mr. Cabrera and Mr. Zubaran explained that they hoped there might be some peaceful way of solving the Mexican problem; that they, too, wished to avoid further bloodshed but councils and mediation conferences were valueless unless they took into consideration terms the constitutionalists demand. He said the various chiefs never would agree to any change of present plans unless some one so prominent in the constitutionalist ranks as to guarantee their forces absolute control were elevated to the presidency.

The plan of Guadalupe, to which Mr. Cabrera said allegiance had been sworn by the constitutionalist leaders, came up for discussion. He said the plan could not be changed unless something more acceptable were offered. The plan provides for a military conquest of Mexico City and the establishment there of General Carranza as provisional president until the country is pacified and preparations made for a general election.

Mr. Cabrera argued that unless the Huerta delegates were ready to arrange for a peaceful surrender, it was useless to discuss neutral persons for the presidency. He said that in the event of surrender, guarantee of amnesty for the deserving would be given.

The American delegates made no comment on the constitutionalist argument. Mr. Lehmann's manner tonight indicated that a crisis in the mediation had been reached, though his words gave no inkling of what the future might hold.

The Mexican delegates tonight issued another statement in repudiation of the claims of former Senator Charles A. Towne that he represented in Washington the interests of the Huerta government.

### SEVEN MEN BURNED IN LODGING HOUSE

Five in Milford, Mass., Claimed Laborers as Victims Early on Yesterday.

(By Associated Press.)

Milford, Mass., June 16.—Seven men were burned to death and twenty seriously injured when eight persons were trapped in a burning Armenian lodging house early today.

The bodies were taken from the upper floors of the four and a half story brick and wooden building.

In addition to the twenty men taken on to the hospital suffering from burns or from injuries received in jumping, thirty sustained minor hurts. The interior of the building was burned out. The fire, the cause of which has not been determined, started in the dining hall on the ground floor. When firemen arrived flames were shooting through all four floors. Escape by the two narrow stairways was cut off and the only means of getting out of the building was by jumping from the windows.

The victims were laborers and molders employed at a manufacturing plant in Hopkinton. None of them had families. The financial loss is small.

### WANT FEDERAL TROOPS

Soldiers Asked For To Settle Montana Mine Troubles.

(By Associated Press.)

Washington, June 15.—Governor Stewart, of Montana, telegraphed President Wilson today asking that federal troops be sent to restore order in the Butte copper mine district.

At the same time the governor sent messages to the Montana senators and representatives in congress, urging them to call at the white house and support his request. Senators Moyers and Walsh, and Representatives Evans and Stout at once arranged to see the president tomorrow morning.

In the meantime do one would discuss the situation. The members of congress intimated that they were ready to stand behind the governor in any course he deemed wise to pursue, but it was evident that the call for aid from the national government had come as a surprise.
