During the past five months in Taylor, has been conducting spinning tests in various cottons at the New Bedford Textile school. The study included Arisona Egyptian Sakellarides cotton, the object being to determine the relative spinning values of these three varieties. The cotton tested was from 1 1-2 fact to 1 5-3 inch staple. Mr. Taylor has practically completed these tests, and he returned to washingt.
