MUST ENROLL ALL THE NAME

TO BE ABSOLUTELY SURE OF NOT BEING CHALLENGED IN PRIMARY

MR. EVANS RULES

States That it Would be Better to Take No Chances on The Proposition Submitted

Ex-Gov. John Gary Evans, chairman of the state democratic executive committee, has written a letter to the chairman of the Anderson county executive committee, confirming the statement made over the phone Monday to The Daily Intelligencer with reference to the enrolling of names for the approaching democratic primary. The following is a copy of his letter to Mr. Dean and to Mr. Leo L. Rice:

Dear Sirs:—Your letter to W. J. McGowan, secretary, has been forwarded to me. You make inquiry as to whether it is necessary that an applicant for membership to democratic clubs be required to enroll his full name. I desire to call your attention to Rule Eight, adopted by the state convention, May 20th, 1914. "Each applicant for enrollment shall in person write upon the club roll his full name, and immediately thereafter his age, occupation and postoffice address, etc. The enrollment now before me is what is a man's full name. This is not a matter upon which there can be two opinions, as it has been decided by the highest courts in the country. "A man's full name in law is his Christian name and his surname. The law recognizes but one Christian name. An error in the middle name may be disregarded as surplusage. The omission of the middle letter between the Christian and surname is no misnomer and needs no remedy. This rule applies to ballots and votes." Keene vs. Margaret Meade. Third Peters U. S. Reports, Page 1. You are aware of the fact that a great many persons are known by their middle names instead of by their first Christian names. For instance, John Thomas Arnold signs his name and is known as J. Thomas Arnold. On the other hand, John Tobias Arnold is known as John Tobias Arnold and signs his name J. T. Arnold. The object of the rule of the party was to identify these two Arnolds so that there could be no possible mistake in the one being allowed to vote in the name of the other. If these Arnolds were allowed to enroll as J. T. Arnold, it would lead to untold confusion, but if they are required to enroll as John Thomas Arnold and John Tobias Arnold, everybody will know who is meant, and there can be no confusion.

The Warning.
As chairman of the party, it is my duty, when called upon to make a ruling upon any rule of the party, to make a construction that will be an absolute protection to the voter and afford no loop hole through which trouble may arise. I do not pretend to say that a man who enrolls his name by his initials will not be allowed to vote, nor do I state that a man, who enrolls his first Christian name and leaves out the middle name, will not be allowed to vote, but I do say that a man enrolls his full Christian name and his surname, and if he has two Christian names and enrolls both Christian names and his surname, there is no power on earth that can prevent that man from voting. He has complied absolutely with the law, and nobody can gainsay it. Any other construction would leave the matter open to protest and probably the loss of a vote, and, therefore I urge our citizens to enroll their full names, and take no chances. Of course, you understand when a man's name is on the roll, the managers must allow him to vote unless that vote is protested, and in that case, the matter must be heard by the committee and it is possible to carry it into the courts. I have no hesitancy as a lawyer, in saying that a man who enrolls his name by his initials, does not comply with the rule of the party nor with the decisions of the highest courts in the land.
