When it was first determined that an association of Anderson county school trustees would be a good thing to have the idea seemed to meet with popular favor, so far as the trustees were concerned, and after the association was formed it was soon seen that it would be a favor for improving educational conditions in this county. The few meetings held have been productive of much good and now comes the best meeting that the association has ever held, the meeting which is to take place on July 6.

Miss Eva Hite, who is president of the Rural School Improvement Association of South Carolina, has accepted the invitation to be present and deliver an address and she has made definite announcement that she will attend.

Dr. J. LaBruce Ward, head of the sanitation work of the State Board of Health and one of the best known citizens in the State, has accepted an invitation to attend the meeting and he will speak to the trustees along lines of interest to them. By following Dr. Ward's advice, the Anderson trustees will be able to do much in the way of improving sanitary conditions in the county schools.

J. E. Swearingen, superintendent of education, has also been invited to attend and Mr. Swearingen has written, saying that he will make every possible effort to get here and that he hopes to attend.

If the Anderson county trustees are awake to their duty, every school will be represented when the meeting is called to order in the court house on July 6. This will be a meeting worth while and it will be a long time before another opportunity like this comes to Anderson.

**TATE'S PLACE IS TO BE FILLED**

**Supt Swearingen Says He Has Secured Money and Has Man In View**

Columbia, June 26.—The work of state supervisor of rural elementary schools in South Carolina which was inaugurated by W. K. Tate, several years ago, is to be carried forward, according to J. E. Swearingen, state superintendent of education, who returned today from Nashville, Tenn., where he attended the annual meeting of the Association of Southern State Superintendents of Education.

Mr. Swearingen announced that the general education board had given \$1,500 for the work of supervising the schools in South Carolina to supplement the appropriation of \$1,900 made by the last general assembly. It was stated by Mr. Swearingen that a successor to Prof. Tate is to be selected at an early date. "I have practically decided upon the man," said Mr. Swearingen.

**Grand Jury Called.**

**Special Body Will Investigate La Salle Case.**

Chicago, June 26.—A special United States grand jury will be called to investigate the affairs of the La Salle Street National Bank, the predecessor of the La Salle Street Trust and Savings Bank, it was announced today. A preliminary report of government accountants has revealed that between \$600,000 and \$850,000 was loaned to companies in which officers of the bank were interested, and to political friends.

A loan of \$40,000 made to Thomas H. Paynter, former United States Senator from Kentucky, had been reduced by payments. Investigation showed until his present indebtedness to the bank is \$2,646, which he says he will pay on demand.

**MOUNTAIN ROAD TO BE IMPROVED**

**W. M. Brown Writes of the Walthalla Route To Toxaway**

(From Saturday's Daily.)

"We are moving right along with the road and hope by July 15 to have everything completed," says W. M. Brown, chairman of the Walthalla good roads committee, in a letter to Commissioner Watson, discussing the Columbia-Anderson-Walthalla-Highlands and Lake Toxaway automobile highway.

"On the 15th inst.," says Mr. Brown, "I went over this road from Walthalla to Highlands, N. C., and found the road on the South Carolina side to be in good shape with the exception of a few places, and they are not very bad, for, as you know, the Walthalla people have spent considerable money in laying out and building a road that will be both safe and pleasant to drive over. While we are still at work and do not expect to stop until we have the best road of any section from the low country to the mountains, yet there are still needed improvements.

"When I reached the Georgia line, I found some road that will require considerable attention before it will be a first-class road and yet they have done some splendid work and so that it is now very little trouble to go up the mountain. There is a section of the Georgia side that will require a lot of work to finish, but they now have a large squad of men working this part, being paid by the people of Walthalla and Highlands. Passing through this part and coming to the North Carolina line you come to one of the best made sections of the entire road, and you hardly realize that you are in the mountains or that you are climbing the mountains. The Highland people know how to do things.

"Again, referring to the trip of the 15th I will say that the trip was made in a motor truck with five other gentlemen, making the amount of weight carried about 1,100 pounds. We started from Walthalla at 12:10 o'clock, making the first 12 miles, in just one hour, taking dinner at A. M. Brown's. We made the remainder of the run of 30 miles (over the worst of the road) in three hours, making the entire time for the trip four hours. The home run which was made on the 17th, occupied three and one-half hours. This would make the round trip in seven and one-half hours with a heavy motor-truck. Judging by this five or six hours would be sufficient time to make the round trip when the road is in perfect condition.

"We have a plan on foot to buy a motor truck and put on a daily round trip service from Walthalla to Highlands as a regular thing. This would give your people in Columbia and from all over the State, a chance to run up to the mountains almost any day, and spend one day and get back to town in a short time. We would like to object to them spending Sunday at Walthalla. I will also state that the Cashler's Valley road from Walthalla to Cashler's, N. C., will be worked out and will be a splendid road to that section of the mountains. I have had a letter from Mr. Pell of Cashler's saying that the road made a good road from Cashler's to the South Carolina line, with the excep-

**GRUESOME EXHIBIT**

Sunday School Conventions Held On Tombstones.

Chicago, June 28.—Most of the reports and addresses at the Sunday school convention here are cheerful, optimistic affairs, but the Scientific Temperance Federation of Boston has chosen a gloomy but effective method to drive its lesson home. It is an exhibit of statistics with graves and tombstones as symbols.

Demonstrating the number of deaths in Basel, Switzerland, in a certain period as the result of alcoholic indulgence a row of graves painted black is used, with the statistics on the

headstones. Then there is a row of wooden figures in convict garb, accompanied by statistics showing that 95 per cent of them owed their trouble to strong drink.

A country without opium in 1920 was the prediction made for China in an address today by Rev. Wilbur F. Crafts of Washington.

The chief encouragement of the movement for world-wide prohibition or the use of opium has been the unprecedented success of the Chinese government in suppressing the traffic, the speaker said. "It was admitted by the British embassy in Washington a few months ago that 85 per cent of the poppy growing and 30 per cent of the opium smoking had ceased. In five Chinese provinces the suppression is complete, and five more will be added soon."

Following Oats with Peas.

Peas have been sown on the land on the Clemson College farm from which a fine crop of oats was taken the first part of the month.
