AN OIL FIRM WON THEIR CASE

Secured Verdict Yesterday in Court at Greenville in Case of Crumby vs. W. O. W. In the case of Crumby versus the Woodmen of the World, which consumed all of yesterday in the Greenville court of Common Pleas, Quinbaum & Cochran, attorneys for the defendant company, succeeded in securing a directed verdict from the presiding judge. There was considerable interest in this case in Anderson, due to the fact that things of a similar nature have come up in this county several times in the past. The plaintiff was asking for the sum of \$1,000, the premium held in the name of the defendant company, and the payment on the ground that the premium had not been paid and the policy therefore allowed to lapse.

MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

Papers Read and Resolutions Were Adopted. The County Medical Association met in the rooms of the chamber of commerce at noon Wednesday for their usual monthly session. The president, Dr. Ashmore, was in the chair, and in the absence of the regular secretary, Dr. Olga Pruitt, Dr. H. Pruitt acted as secretary pro tem. A paper on Gastritis was given by Dr. J. D. Sanders. This was fully discussed by the other doctors present, and they feel that much was gained in information on this subject. The only other paper on the program was a report of clinical cases by Dr. Waller H. Nerlin. A committee was appointed by the chairman to draft resolutions on the death of a member of this body, Dr. S. R. Heller, of Greenville, who died this week. Another committee to draft resolutions in commendation of Dr. Lee Sanders, and regret over his departure from the county to the Mayo, of Rochester. Dr. J. R. Young, who is in attendance upon the National Medical Association at Atlantic City, is attending clinics in Philadelphia and did not get here in time to give a report. This will likely be given at the next meeting, in September. The meeting in August will not be held.

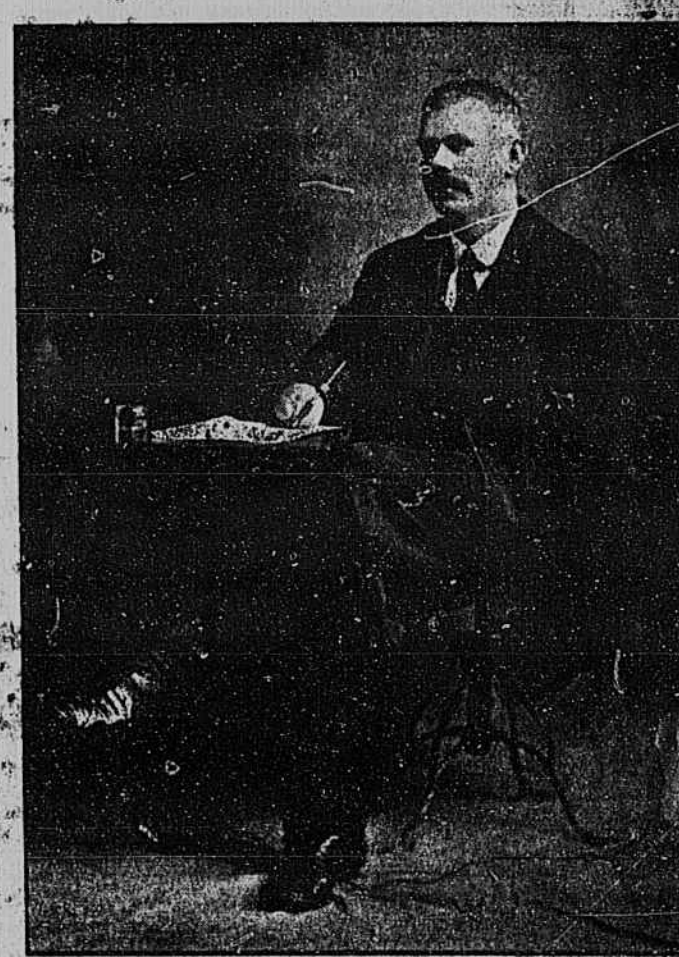
