WOMEN BELEAGUER PRESIDENT WILSON IN THE WHITE HOUSE

Would Cross Examine Him About Woman's Suffrage Stand

UP TO THE STATES HE TOLD THEM

Avoiding the Feminine Traps, Wilson Finally Had to Tell the Party That He Objected

Washington, June 30.—Five hundred members of the general federation of women's clubs marched to the White House today and drew from President Wilson a final refusal to accede to demands that he support the movement for a woman suffrage amendment to the federal constitution.

The women went away plainly disappointed and chagrined, some of them talking of immediate action against the democratic party.

Leaders Talked. Once inside the white house the women made no demonstrations and allowed their leaders to do all the talking.

President's Talk. "No one could fail to be impressed by this great company of thoughtful women," said the president.

"I think that very few persons, perhaps, realize the difficulty of the dual duty that must be exercised by a president of the United States."

"I do not think that there is anything to do with my conviction, as to the best way that it can be done," returned the president.

Would it not be a state matter then?" persisted Mrs. Wiley.

"Yes, but by a very different process, for by that process it would be forced upon the minority; they would have to accept it."

"Thank you, Mr. President, for the courtesy," replied Mrs. Wiley.

SOME DETAILS OF THE KILLING

As Brought Out in Evidence at Coroner's Inquest at Williamston Monday Night

(From Wednesday's Daily.) Solicitor K. P. Smith and Coroner Hardin have returned from Williamsston, where they had charge of the inquest over the body of Wm. Kelly, who was shot and killed by C. O. Poore.

There was some interesting evidence brought out at the inquest, and while some matters may be cleared up later on, the facts as presented look hard for the defendant. The intelligencer stated Tuesday morning that an eye witness had stated that the dead man was in his shirt sleeves and had his hands over his head when he was shot.

I found Mr. Kelly about 10:30 o'clock this morning lying in front of Sullivan's store. His physical condition at that time was one of the gravest I ever saw. He was suffering from the effects of four wounds received. I administered first aid and carried him to Greenville for operation. He died in the ambulance just as we reached his home. We carried him to Mackey's undertaking establishment where I examined the body and found the following marks of violence: first wound, bullet wound in line with left nipple between 7th and 8th ribs, the exit being between 9th and 10th ribs. Second wound, 2 1/2 inch left side, midway of crest of left hip, exit being 4 inches through guttural maxillary nerve, through guttural maxillary nerve on level Fourth wound, three inches lower down on leg on same side as others—no exit. Either of the first two wounds mentioned would have caused death in my opinion. His death was due to hemorrhage and the shock."

A. G. Plackner, a well known resident of this place, being duly sworn, testified as follows:

I don't remember the time, but I think it was about 10 o'clock. I was in front of Sullivan's store, and saw Mr. Kelly, who had been shot, in the pharmacy and go between drug store and Sullivan's store. He was followed by Mr. Claude Poore, who was about 60 or 80 feet behind Mr. Kelly. When I got opposite the opening of the alley I saw Mr. Kelly, who was bleeding, and Mr. Poore, whose back was turned toward me, look over his shoulder from the sidewalk and I saw Mr. Kelly. Mr. Kelly was in front of his store, both hands extended in front of him open, while Mr. Poore was with his back to me a little to the right of Mr. Kelly. Mr. Poore had a coat on. As I saw Mr. Poore, I heard Mr. Kelly say, "I want to tell you that you acted in a d—dirty way yesterday. I have no gun and I don't care if you have. I want to tell you this." Mr. Poore said, "D—d come on me, Joe Kelly." Mr. Kelly made no move that I saw. Mr. Poore drew his pistol from his right front pants pocket. I think raised it with both hands and fired until the magazine clicked. At the first shot Mr. Kelly fell forward. Griffin's drug store was about 20 feet behind him. He fell to the ground. At that time Mr. Nelson took the pistol from Mr. Poore and Mr. Kelly fell over the sidewalk at the corner of Sullivan's store. There were about 20 or 25 people there.
