## CHANGES BEING MADE IN BUSINESS PROPERTY

C. S. MINOR SOLD LEASE ON PRESENT QUARTERS

NEW FIRM COMING

J. H. Anderson Bought Property From G. H. Bailes and Bailes Bought on Main Street

The last few days have witnessed a number of changes being made in the ownership of buildings around town and local real estate seems to be soaring at a very rapid rate. Business houses are in demand and notwithstanding this, a number of new stores are now in course of construction, and there is an ever-increasing demand.

One of the most interesting deals taking place in Anderson within the last few days occurred yesterday when J. Rubenstein & Son of Augusta, Ga., purchased the lease from C. S. Minor which that gentleman has held on the public square property where his 5 and 10 cent store is located. Mr. Minor has sold his lease to the August firm effective September 1, they will have charge of the building. They will open a first class dry goods store, handling dry goods, clothing, shoes, and will have one of the best stores in the city, according to a statement made yesterday by Mr. Rubenstein. He is favorably impressed with Anderson and says that it is one of the best business towns in South Carolina.

Mr. Minor recently bought the lease held by J. T. McCowry & Son, of the Brown building, which is located on Main street, and also purchased the stock of groceries which that store has been carrying. Mr. Minor said yesterday that he had already assumed charge of the grocery store and would continue to conduct it until he disposed of the stock or secured another building in which to place it. The new stand which Mr. Minor has secured is owned by D. G. Brown and that gentleman has agreed to make a number of changes on the place before Mr. Minor moves his establishment. He will place a steel ceiling in the building, install new show windows, repaint the place both inside and out, change the stair case system and on the whole, the place will be one of the prettiest business houses in the city when all the improvements are completed. Mr. Brown is having the plans drawn now for the re-arrangement of the place and a force day.

Another business deal of interest has just occurred here. J. H. Anderson has purchased from G. H. Bailes and Bailes the public square property now occupied by the Lester property, the same company will continue to occupy this place and so far as is known there are no changes contemplated. Mr. Bailes has in turn purchased a half interest in one of the A. R. buildings on Main street, securing this property from T. S. Crayton.

Many improvements are contemplated on various business properties around town and it is probable that business buildings in the main section will continue to be one of the city for some months to come.
