WRITE FULL NAME SAYS CHUM, EVANS

Says It Is Better To Be On the Safe Side and To Avoid Trouble

Spartanburg, July 10.—"The safest way to enroll for the coming election is for the applicant to write his full name on the democratic club rolls," said John Gary Evans, chairman of the state democratic executive committee, who returned from Columbia yesterday, where on Tuesday he presided over a session of the committee when the matter of proper enrollment was discussed at full length.

In reiteration of his construction of the law, which he presented at the special session, Mr. Evans said today: "The United States supreme court holds that where a man's name is John Thomas Smith, and he enrolls his name as John T. Smith, and he enrolls his name John T. Smith, that such enrollment constitutes his full name, as the law does not recognize a middle name. But on the other hand, there are a great many people who are known by their middle names, their first name being unknown, for instance James Thomas Smith may be known as J. Thomas Smith. There is a doubt in my mind under the decision whether the enrollment, J. Thomas Smith would be correct.

Law Is Complicated. "There is no doubt under the law and the rules of the party, that where a man enrolls both his Christian names, if he has more than one, there can be no grounds of protest on the part of anybody. Therefore if should be requested that those offering to enroll should take the time to write their full names so as to save any trouble with the county executive committee, whose business it is to scratch off the names of any which are not so written, and this will also insure the avoidance of any trouble and unpleasantness with election managers on election days.

"The court has further held that where a man's name is required to be written in full, a mere writing of his initials is not sufficient and under the law and the rules of the party, he cannot be allowed to vote, and if he should vote and the vote contested, it would be thrown out, as the supreme court has ruled on this matter in separate cases."

Mr. Evans quoted this ruling in substantiation of the necessity of enrolling full names, but he states that in all probability this will not be rigidly observed at the polls, but votes nevertheless may be contested on these grounds.

"Statutes Will Be Enforced." "Let everybody take the absolutely safe way of enrolling," emphasized Mr. Evans, "and thus be insured against any doubt as to the right to vote. It requires but little more time and ink and no voter who objects to writing his name in full can blame any person but himself if he loses his vote if it is lost."

"This election is going to be conducted strictly according to law and if the managers fail to do their duty they will be punished under the statute. It might be well to have it understood now that any person who thinks he can override the statutes of the state and the rules of the party and vote contrary to law will find himself badly mistaken on election day," said Governor Evans.

The county executive committee appointed the managers for the primary elections. Mr. Evans desires all people who are interested in good government to enroll their full names on the books and do it at once. The time is now rapidly drawing to a close and if they are not enrolled on or before July 28, there is no possible way by which their names can be placed on the rolls.

Can Now Correct Mistake "If any man has signed his name upon the books using only his initials he should at once correct the mistake. People at the cotton mills are enrolling very fully, but the voters of the towns and cities the other way in the matter. I understand that only about 80 per cent of the voters in Spartanburg have enrolled."

"A man need not have a cent in his pocket. He may not know how to read and write, and he may be ever so poor, high or low, he is entitled to be enrolled in a democratic club, provided he is a citizen of the state and the county six months prior to the first election and in the precinct 29 days prior to the first election following his offer to enroll.

"If a voter moves out of the precinct in which he is enrolled he may return to this precinct and cast his ballot in the approaching elections."

NOTICE DEMOCRATS.

On July 28th, 1914 the club rolls will close. After that date no name shall be enrolled. All democrats are urged to enroll at their nearest club without delay. If any qualified voter fails to enroll he can blame only himself. Write your full name on the club roll and do it now. All clubs except Cox mill, Grove School and Slabtown have sent in the names of their enrollment committees. These clubs are urged to send them in without delay.

The secretaries of all the clubs will send in the club rolls between the 28th of July and August 1st, and the executive committees from each club is requested to see that this rule is complied with.

The time for filing pledges and paying assessment of candidates expires on August 7th, at 12 o'clock sharp. The pledge is to be filed with the secretary and the assessment paid to him.

TROOPS WILL GO TO ENCAMPMENT

May Go Unarmed as Citizens and Arms Shipped As Baggage or Express

(By Associated Press.) Washington, July 9.—The refusal of Governor Blease to permit North Carolina and Georgia militia troops to pass through South Carolina en route to the military encampment at Augusta, has not been the basis of representations to the war department, and in the opinion of officials will not be.

Although the state troops will go to the encampment on invitation of the war department, they have no federal status and officials said today the department had no authority to order their transportation through South Carolina.

It was pointed out that the militia of one state may not enter another state without express permission from the governor, but the suggestion was that the order of the South Carolina governor might be circumvented by the militiamen traveling through the state as individual passengers, unarmed. If this plan were resorted to, the troopers' arms could be sent by express or as baggage.

AGENT ADMITS GUILT

Long, station agent at Good Hope, who on the night of July 2 reported he had been robbed of \$5,000 consigned to the Bank of Good Hope, today confessed to the robbery, according to the police. Long was found bound and gagged in a room at the bank in his mouth. He said two men overpowered him as he took the money from the train.
