Huerta's Successor a Jurist of Note: Not a Partisan in Mexican Politics

Francisco Carbajal Known as a Man of High Character and Great Ability—Formerly Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Mexico—Huerta a Very Rich Man

Francisco Carbajal, appointed the minister of foreign relations in the Huerta cabinet, and who under the Mexican constitution, accedes to the presidency with the retirement of Huerta, is one of the most distinguished lawyers and jurists of Mexico. He has never engaged in political affairs in Mexico, adhering strictly to the practice of his profession and his duties of the bench. At the time of his appointment to the foreign ministry Senor Carbajal was chief justice of the supreme court of Mexico, a position which he had held previously, as a new chief justice is chosen from among the members of the supreme bench each year. He is a native of the state of Campeche.

Victoriano Huerta rose, ruled and fell in Mexico an army man. The army, which the Constitutionalist declare will be the first thing abolished, supported him and exalted him. When it was no longer able to stem the onrush of the revolutionary flood there was nothing else for him to do but to get out.

Yet this man, who kept up his fight for seventeen months, was born an Indian peon in December, 1864 at Colatlan, in the state of Jalisco. He was bright, active and industrious, and acquired the rudiments of an education from a good parish priest, whom he had long delighted to honor.

He wanted to be a soldier from the first, and his opportunity came in 1871, when General Donata Guerra led an expedition through the native place at the command of President Juarez. Guerra needed a secretary to write some dispatches for him, and young Huerta stepped forward in his sandals to volunteer. He pleased the soldier, who questioned him.

"I want to go to Chapultepec," was the reply. Chapultepec, the West Point of Mexico, had always been the school for the aristocrat, but Guerra liked the lad. He interceded in his favor and President Juarez gave him an appointment. He came out four years later a lieutenant with honors, and in 1876 he won honors at the Battle of Tecuac, where Porfirio Diaz commanded.

According to the standards of civilized nations, Huerta is guilty of wanton murder. He destroyed the men whom he thought plotted against his government. In his defense, it is pointed out that he did what Diaz did for thirty-four years; what every Constitutionalist commanded did up to three months ago. It was the law of the army to spare none and he followed it.

Huerta is a wealthy man. He owns a large ranch in Chihuahua marble quarries in another state, and has an interest in some manufacturing enterprises. He never lived at the Castle of Chapultepec because he said the castle on the rock was too long some for an old Indian. He seldom stopped at the national palace.

Within three months he completed a fine home in the suburbs of the capital, where he established his family. He remained there some of his time. He did not like to appear publicly at regular places. He chose different routes and different places from time to time. Very often he would shift the cabinet meetings.

"My mother feels me that a good Indian never goes over the same trail twice," he explained to a friend. Yet he did not appear much afraid of assassination. When driving he used an open touring car; when he walked the streets he seldom had more than one aide. He visited stores alone and frequently stopped to talk with men in the street. No matter what else may be said of Victoriano Huerta—he is no coward.

MYSTERY SOLVED.

San Antonio Doctor Positively Identifies Dead Woman. Galveston, Tex., July 24.—Dr. Maria Bhaefer of Austin, today in a sworn statement identified the body of the woman found on the beach front here Tuesday morning with a bullet hole through her head as that of Miss Elvira Davis, of San Antonio, private secretary to a wealthy resident of San Antonio.

Dr. Bhaefer declared that she had received a letter from the young woman telling of her despondency because of ill health. At the time Miss Davis was enroute from San Antonio to Galveston. Justice of the Peace Harris, before whom an inquest was held directed that a verdict be returned of "death from a gunshot wound caused by party unknown." Mr. Harris accused the theory that the young woman had committed suicide.

RATES NOT UNREASONABLE

Apple Shipped From Shenandoah Valley Upheld by Commission. Washington, July 24.—Existing freight rates on apples from the Shenandoah Valley and the eastern slope of the Blue Ridge Mountains in Virginia to New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington, were held by the interstate commerce commission today to be not unreasonable. All of Anderson county will experience a genuine relief when the campaign comes to an end and the election is over with.

CROPS BADLY DAMAGED

Mr. J. D. Cartee of the Fork section was in Anderson Thursday and states that crops were badly injured by the h. i. He has 60 acres that was at one time quite promising and is now a total loss. He will not get two bales. Of a five horse farm he will not have 15 acres that can be left in cotton and even this is knocked about so much that it will do no good.

He is taking the matter as philosophically as he can, but he says that in addition to the labor and all other considerations he has \$300 worth of fertilizer on the land that was ruined, in the storm of July 9. S. C. Campbell, a neighbor, has 5 or 10 acres of young cotton ruined and Charley McAdams was seriously crippled in his farming operations.

To make the situation worse, the weather has been so dry that the cow peas that were put in will have a hard time to make. Mr. Cartee has been plowing up his cotton and sowing peas. For a few days he just sowed in the middle of the ruined crop, but now the prospects of the cotton revolving are so poor that he has decided to put all in peas. If he could get seed Irish potatoes he would try to make a crop of potatoes for the market.

Mr. Cartee says that he would rather have had a fire to destroy his home than to have been wiped out in this manner by the hail. He could build a house somehow, but to start another crop is a hard undertaking.

LEVER BILL.

To Be Used in Regulating Transactions in Cotton Futures. Washington, July 24.—Senate and House conferees reached an agreement late last night on bills to regulate transactions in "futures" on cotton exchanges. It was said the bill would follow the lines of the Lever measure, which already has passed the house. The bill will be introduced immediately as a substitute for the Lever measure and the Smith senate bill.

The Lever bill proposed a prohibitive tax upon dealings in cotton not conforming to government standards. CITY TRYING TO SETTLE DISPUTE

Council Will Hold a Conference With C. & W. C. Railroad in Reference to Drains. Following the action of the Anderson city council in its meeting of that body held last Tuesday evening, it seemed that a suit between the Charleston and Western Carolina railway and the city of Anderson was inevitable. However, things have taken a different turn and it now seems that an amicable settlement may be reached.

Members of the city council gathered yesterday at noon and talked the matter over. The situation is simple: that the new drains which the railroad is to place along Market street will cost about \$2,500 and the railroad wants the city to pay one-half of the amount. The city council at the last meeting voted down the appropriation, but at yesterday's meeting a committee was selected to confer with the railroad people and see if the matter can be settled. The committee will be composed of Mayor Holloman, Alderman Humpreys and City Attorney Sullivan and it is believed that the entire matter will be settled. Mr. Sullivan is away for 3 weeks.

ANOTHER STATEMENT OF THE REQUIREMENTS

ANDERSON PEOPLE MUST BE ENROLLED

LITTLE TIME LEFT

What Is Necessary in Order To Exercise Right of Suffrage in Coming Primary Election

Time and time again the newspapers of this state have printed the full requirements for voting in the next primary election, but even now there are many people in Anderson county in ignorance of what must be done before they will be allowed to vote in the coming election. I order that this situation may be remedied so far as possible, The Intelligencer gives herewith an interview in the shape of questions and answers which should enable every voter to clearly understand the requirements. Q. If a man lives outside of an incorporated city or town where shall he vote? A. He must vote in his own county, at the voting place of the nearest club. Q. What has the township got to do with it? A. The township lines have nothing to do with it. The voter goes to the nearest club to register to vote. Q. Do not the rules require a club in each township? A. Yes, but there is no penalty for a violation of this rule. This was simply a part of the original idea. Every person must vote at his nearest club regardless of township lines. Any other construction would be a great hardship, because some times a main street at one end of a township, and it would be very inconvenient to force him to go away down to the other end to vote. This was discussed thoroughly in the conference and the original draft was amended so as to allow the person to go to the nearest club in his county.

Q. In cities of over 10,000 inhabitants, may a person living outside of the city vote therein? A. No. In cities of over 10,000 nobody can vote except those living within the city limits, and then a man must vote in the ward where he lives. There is no exception to this rule. According to the census of 1910 this rule applies to only the following cities: Charleston, Columbia, Greenville and Spartanburg.

Q. Suppose a man lives just outside the city limits of Belton, for instance, and the box inside the limits is nearer to him than any other, can he go into town and vote? A. Yes. He can go into any town in the state to vote if the town box is nearer to him, except in the four cities of Charleston, Columbia, Greenville and Spartanburg.

Q. Is it necessary in enrolling in the city of Anderson to write down the postoffice address in addition to the street and number? A. Nobody can enroll in the city of Anderson except those whose post-office address is "Anderson, S. C." and all that is necessary to write on the book is the full name, the age, occupation, the street and the house number. If the house has no number, of course, that cannot be given. It is obviously useless to write "Anderson, S. C." after every name in the city, when nobody except residents of this city can enroll. When it comes to the districts outside of the city, however, the person must write his full post-office address.

Q. In other words, the whole purpose of the rules is to get down to the "Am" of every man in full, with his age, occupation and complete address. The rules are not intended to cut a man (to say the least) of the rules and against plain justice to deprive any man of his vote. These requirements, however, do enable us to detect non-residents and repeaters, and to put in force the criminal statutes which impose a fine and imprisonment for fraudulent voting.

Q. Suppose a man moves from a club district after he has enrolled. Where does he vote? A. Each man must enroll in the club district where he is living at the time of enrollment. If he moves out of the club district within sixty days prior to the election, he can be taken to vote where he was originally enrolled.

County Chairman Dan Pearman says: "I will be very glad to have any person call on me at my office or on the telephone to answer any question to the best of my ability concerning the rules, regardless of what faction he belongs to. I am more interested in seeing the rules understood and followed than in the success of any candidate. I also have some copies of the rules which I will be glad to distribute as long as they hold out."

MAY WITHDRAW NAME

Unless Warburg, Makes Fight, President May Act. (By Associated Press.) Washington, July 24.—Whether President Wilson and administration leaders in the senate will make a fight for the confirmation of Paul M. Warburg as a member of the federal reserve board was said tonight to depend upon Mr. Warburg's final decision regarding his resignation before the senate banking committee. Unless the banker within the next few days reconsiders his request to be questioned by the committee, it is expected that the president will withdraw the nomination and select another man for the post.
