**ANDERSON IS ASKED**  
**TO CONTRIBUTE \$1,000**  
**FOR THE SOUTH CAROLINA**  
**EXHIBIT**

AT THE EXPOSITION  
Joint Meeting of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce and City Council Held Last Night

(From Wednesday's Daily.)  
Anderson will be asked to contribute \$1,000 as her share toward the South Carolina exhibit for the Panama Exposition, according to plans made last night at a joint meeting of the Anderson chamber of commerce. The meeting was held in the rooms of the local chamber of commerce and was well attended. Interest was evident in the scheme and the men present enthusiastically endorsed the plan. James D. Hammett presided over the meeting and the first speaker to address the audience was Albert Blum, special state representative for South Carolina of the Panama exhibit. Mr. Blum elaborated on the proposed plan and seemed to have all the details of the exhibit at his fingertips. He showed that the exhibit provides a splendid opportunity, from an advertising standpoint, for the people of the South and more especially for the people of South Carolina. He says that the eyes of the people of South America, Central America, and the Orient are now turned in the direction of this country and that the Panama exhibit will do much toward attracting trade from those countries to the United States and to the South. In support of his statement, Mr. Blum pointed to an exhibit which President Harrison of the Panama Exhibit gave to the San Francisco "Call" a few days ago, in which the president said that no other section of the country has so much to hope for in the way of advertising and of results as has the Piedmont section of the South. Mr. Blum was made a complete inspection of the city of Anderson and while he had hoped to secure 1,000 feet of moving picture film of this city, he said last night that owing to the compactness of the city he will be able to display this city's advantages very nicely in 223 feet, although he would like to have more if possible.

A. S. Farmer, special Panama Exhibit commissioner for this district, was the second speaker to address the meeting and he delivered a short talk in which he enthusiastically endorsed the proposition and stressed the importance of the advertising to be secured from such an exhibit. He says that the limit of all times for the South to advertise her resources is here and he urged the acceptance of the plan providing for this city to take part.

The meeting was fortunate in having the presence of Charles K. Bryant, of the state and architect of the Virginia building of the exposition. Mr. Bryant has just returned from San Francisco, where he went to let the contract for the Virginia building. Mr. Bryant is now having plans for the exposition grounds, but he says that the South Carolina exhibit will be pictures from real life. Mr. Bryant said that he would show the people of Anderson by subscribing to the Anderson fund and he made a very interesting appeal for the fund.

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**SECURED SUFFICIENT FUNDS FOR EXHIBIT**

ANDERSON RAISED HER PORTION OF PANAMA MONEY

TO SHOW PICTURES After Canvass of City, Practically All Money Necessary To Represent Anderson Is Secured

The public will be glad to learn that sufficient money has been raised in this city to insure Anderson's representation in the state-wide moving picture film which will be sent from South Carolina to the Panama Exposition and there exhibited during the entire time that the exposition is to run. This film is to portray life in South Carolina for the homesaker in a very charming manner. The money for this film was raised in Anderson by the Anderson chamber of commerce commissioner for this state. He completed his work in Anderson yesterday and left in the afternoon for Spartanburg, hence to Greenville, Greenwood and Rock Hill. When he completes his work in Rock Hill he will make a detour and will visit Union, Chester and Lancaster. He plans to finish the work in the up-country by the middle of the month and he will then go to Charleston, Georgetown, Beaufort and then through the Pee Dee, finishing his canvass of the state at Aiken.

It was understood yesterday that the amount of money secured in Anderson was not as large as had been desired but it will be sufficient to give this city a good representation and to display the advantages of Anderson in a very advantageous manner. It is expected that the official photographer, together with several assistants, will arrive in Anderson within the next few days and begin the work of taking the pictures for the film. No decision has been reached as to the views of this city to be shown, other than that they will include Anderson College, the First Presbyterian church, the court house, a view of the public square and of the handsome suburban home of J. J. Fretwell and one of the Anderson fire department. These views are to be made under the direction of Anderson's local commissioners, R. A. Ligon, A. S. Farmer, J. D. Hammett and Porter A. Whaley.

Those interested in the matter said yesterday that Manager Blum expressed himself as being well pleased with Anderson but local people deplored the fact that this was his first trip through the south and he was therefore handicapped in presenting his proposition to southern business men, since he did not understand them and did not realize that they cannot be approached in the same way that a northern man is. One gentleman remarked yesterday that he was in hope Mr. Blum might pursue different methods in other towns from the one he followed here.

The gentlemen manifesting the most interest in the undertaking said that it was a matter of regret that the Anderson city council would not agree to lend any assistance, since the city's towns of the state plan to secure liberal contributions from their councils, thus putting the burden of the exhibit upon the entire city and not upon individuals, but the local council could not see why the city should contribute anything.

However, it is a matter of common knowledge all over the state that Anderson always does her part toward anything of this nature and in this particular instance her people did their share as they have always done.

**COTTON CATERPILLAR**  
Clemson College Gives Information About the Nefarious Pest.

Clemson College, Sept 2.—Late cotton in many parts of the Piedmont is seriously threatened by the cotton caterpillar, which has made its appearance very suddenly. Telegrams and letters are being received by the extension division and botanology division of Clemson College in which urgent requests for help are made. The caterpillar works with amazing rapidity when it begins on a cotton plant and prey prevention must be taken as soon as the pests are discovered; otherwise they will not avail.

The entomology division of Clemson College has prepared the catechism printed in the Intelligencer Tuesday, which all farmers are advised to read carefully. This gives all needed information about the cotton caterpillar. Farmers are advised to keep close watch on their fields and to take the measures recommended just as soon as the first signs of the insect are seen.

**ANDERSON COUNTY TO BE SAVED BY CORN**

GOOD ADVICE FOR THE FARMERS TO FOLLOW

TRIPLE THE CROP Secretary Whaley Outlines Views and Shows How Planters Can Reap Rich Harvest

(From Thursday's Daily.)  
"Every effort must be made vastly to increase the acreage to be planted in oats, cover crops and other grains in Anderson county this fall and it is my purpose, in connection with our farm demonstrator, J. W. Rothrock, to begin within a few days on a propaganda to extend all over the county in this connection," said Porter A. Whaley, secretary of the Anderson chamber of commerce, while talking to a reporter for The Intelligencer yesterday.

Mr. Whaley said that Anderson county grows, will raise about 950,000 bushels of corn, which is itself a banner crop in the history of this county, being about 15,000 more bushels of corn than this county produced last year. Mr. Whaley added: "The crop will be just about enough to supply the needs of Anderson county and in addition it will be sufficient to supply about one-half the demand of the city of Anderson for feeding city-kept stock, though it can possibly be stretched out and made to cover the entire demand. An effort will be made to triple this production for next year and already plans are underway for having the farmers to begin their selection of seed corn for this year's crop for the planting of the crop next year."

The grading will be done along scientific lines and the crop should be superior to the corn produced this year. If Anderson county can produce 3,000,000 bushels of corn next season, which is only three times the amount that the county will have this year, Anderson then can sell 3,000,000 bushels of corn to the outside world. "Estimating that the price in the foreign countries will cause corn to sell in the section next year at 54 per bushel, which now seems very probable, Anderson county will have an income of about \$2,000,000 from corn alone, which would be an unheard-of sum for any southern county. Without doubt, this year can be realized as a direct result of the hog-raising industry in Anderson county will rapidly increase, bringing to an end the importation of pork into this county."

Clemson College has promised to assist in this undertaking and in all probability a horse-to-horse canvass will be inaugurated, during which every white farmer in the county will be visited and he will be urged to give the plan a trial.

It is estimated that every plantation in Anderson county can be visited during a six weeks campaign and this attempt is believed to be one of real value.

As is well known, the oat crop in Anderson county is about 25 per cent larger this year than that of any previous year and an effort will soon be made to have the farmers increase the acreage of oats for the next season, quadrupling it if possible. The propaganda also contemplates increasing the cover crops, although incalculations now are that there will be some difficulty in getting leguminous seeds for these cover crops.

These plans are carried out and Anderson county's cotton crop reduced to 25 or 40 per cent and with corn at \$1 per bushel and oats at 85 cents per bushel, together with fodder and cover crops, Anderson farmers will find that they have a vastly better crop, even though cotton is selling for 10 cents and grain 12 cents.

Those who heard Mr. Whaley discuss the situation were impressed that he is certainly correct and believe that this is the logical solution of the situation, from an Anderson county standpoint.

**COMING HERE FOR THE FINAL FLING**
