ONE MILL PRESIDENT IS NOT PESSIMISTIC SAYS THAT CONDITIONS HERE ARE GOOD

A FINE PROSPECT Local Mills Will Not Need To Curtail and All Mills of State Take a Bright View (From Saturday Daily.) That much of the talk around Anderson about the cotton mills of South Carolina facing a serious situation is untrue, according to the information obtained in different sections of the city and county. The cotton mills of this county and of the whole United States are put in as bad circumstances by conditions brought on by the war in Europe as are the farmers who raise the cotton. This is the sentiment of the president of one of the large mills of this county. He points out that, while the market for cotton has fallen off 3 or 4 cents per pound, the price of manufactured cotton cloth has been reduced 9 cents per pound; that is, so far as the output of this mill is concerned. Similar conditions affect other mills. Even in normal times, the business of running a cotton mill has undergone a vast change within the past 16 years. Fifteen years ago the price of cotton did not change more than one-half cent per pound in two months or more, but now it often changes as much as 4 cents in that time. This makes it impossible for the mill to buy its year's supply of cotton at one time, because to buy cotton at a high price might mean the financial ruin of the former mill. For the same reason, the millmen in New York and other points in the north cannot buy a large amount of cloth from the cotton mills in advance. The mill spoken of has had to increase its warehouse room for storing bales of cloth many times its former size. It is thus easily seen how the present lack of market and uncertainty work a great hardship on the cotton mills. The mills of this county manufacture largely wide and narrow print cloths, for which at present there is almost no demand at all.

The mills in many instances are now running at financial loss, but they feel their moral duty to run on account of the operatives and the farmers of the South. It is also better for them to run, because a large expense would be incurred if the machinery were stopped, not to speak of losses, insurance and interest on capital invested. The working capital of a mill at the present time is necessarily much reduced on account of the large amount of money tied up in cloth stored in the warehouses because of lack of demand. This mill president says that the impression that the mills do not want the price of cotton to be high is all wrong; that he told one of his buyers yesterday that he would be very happy to know that the price of cotton had been fixed at 12 cents. High-priced cotton means high-priced cloth, and has the effect of steadying the market all around. The mills just at this time have a special reason for wanting to see the price of cotton advance, because they are for the most part manufacturing cloth of cotton which they paid from 10 to 12 cents for. To sell the cloth now being made at present prices means great money loss.

WILL BUY-A-BALE OF COTTON HERE Northern Firms Plan to Buy Ten Bales of Cotton in South Carolina, One out of Anderson

Letters are being received in Anderson every day which go to show that the Southern firms are greatly interested in the "Buy-a-Bale" movement now in full swing in the South and the people of means in the Southern States are showing themselves to be very liberal in the manner in which they are coming to the assistance of the South. The following letter was received at the Anderson chamber of commerce yesterday from Thos. H. Pope, South Carolina representative of Seaman Brothers of the White Rose Food products of New York: "I have been instructed by my house to buy five bales of cotton at 10 cents per pound from the 'Buy-a-Bale' plan. I will certainly want a bale of Anderson county cotton and will advise you in a few days to buy it for us." Firms in all parts of the North are purchasing orders daily for cotton at 10 cents and the Southern farmers' prospects are now far from bad.
