There is a statute on the books which require all State banks to publish quarterly statements of their financial condition. Some banks are complying with the statute while others seem to pay no attention to it or not to know the requirement of the law.

Attorney General Gunter, in talking about the matter this morning, said that he expected to give attention to the matter, and he thought that those banks ought, in protection to their depositors and for their own good, to publish these statements as required by
