The Pickens Ark passed this way a few days ago and gave one of our roads a brushing, which we were proud of. We fear the chain gang of this county is not a success; while there has been one in the county for eight or nine years, we think they should have worked one-third of all the roads in each township, by this time. We are not accusing any one who is operating it, for we feel assured that most of them have done their duty. I do not know exactly how much it cost to work a mile of road at present, but I think there is a cheaper way of working them. I think the contract system would be better. Let one man have so many miles of road at first of January to work and pay him at the end of the year—if the work is done right. I have talked with men about the contract system and some say they can work the roads from three to five dollars per mile. There being about eighty-five miles in each township and about 1,100 miles in the county, and I believe the whole County roads can be worked at an average of six dollars per mile.
