No Change of Control. The Greenville News of the 29th ult., says: According to reports received here yesterday from Easley, it was made to appear that the Southern Railway had either leased or bought the Pickens railroad. From the same source it was said that trains would be run on a regular schedule from Pickens to this city. When asked yesterday about the report Mr. Julius E. Boggs, of Pickens, said there was absolutely no foundation for it. He said that a party of Southern Railway officials had visited Pickens a week ago at his request, but it was on another matter and had nothing to do with the sale or lease of the short line. Pickens on a Boom. Robert H. Curston, manager of the recently organized oil mill and ginney at Pickens, is spending today in the city. When seen by a reporter for The Greenville News yesterday Mr. Curston said that the oil mill building had been completed and a quantity of the machinery for the oil mill and ginney had been placed and it was expected to have both plants in operation in time for the coming season. Mr. Curston said that Pickens was on a boom; that an effort was being made to establish a large brick factory in Pickens; that the demand upon the present brick mill was so great that orders could not be filled as rapidly as desired. It is understood that a stock company will be organized and will establish a knitting mill. Some of the leading business men are doing the talking and it is believed that in a short time an organization will be perfected.—Greenville News, 1st inst.
