

DECIDES ON GREAT PROJECT.

Tunnels Under East River For Pennsylvania Road.

New York, Oct. 2.—After months of consultation between eminent engineers of this and other cities, the Pennsylvania Railroad company finally has decided upon the methods by which it will build its tunnels under the North and East rivers, and Manhattan island, and has advertised for bids on the work and material.

The construction between the North river will consist of two single cast iron tubes entering this city at the foot of West Second street, and running under that street. They will be built by the shield process.

The tubes will rest upon what are known as screw pile foundations, made of iron. The East river tunnel will be of similar construction, carrying four tubes.

The underground station in this city will extend from Seventh to Ninth avenue, and from Thirty-first to Thirty-third street.

The power to be used in the tunnel, as required by both the states of New York and New Jersey, will be entirely by electricity, used by through electric locomotives.

ALASKAN BOUNDARY.

Arguments Heard Before Commission in London.

London, Oct. 3.—Sir Edward Carson, solicitor general, consumed the morning session today in endeavoring to refute the arguments of David T. Watson and Hannis Taylor, of counsel for the United States, especially protesting against Mr. Taylor's contention that the term "trend of the coast" could only apply to the political coast line and not to the physical coast line.

If they gave certain answers they might make matters more confused than ever, and open up a new series of diplomatic tangles. The solicitor general concluded with an eloquent reference to Great Britain's unwillingness to give up any of her subjects into the control of other nations. He declared he thought the public might think the commission was slow and that counsel were wasting time; but no time and no money would ever be wasted if the long-standing dispute between the two great and friendly nations could be solved by the tribunal.

To Improve Condition of Negroes.

New York, Oct. 2.—About a hundred delegates are attending a convention in Brooklyn, having for its object the formation of a national association to improve the conditions of the colored people. Rev. Dr. Dean R. Babitt, in addressing the convention deplored sectionalism, urged race harmony and pointed out the great dangers in the present situation of dragging the race question into politics. The object of the delegates is to organize a co-operative society and to establish such commercial and industrial enterprises as life insurance, shoe and provision stores, and anything for the benefit of the race.

Run over by an Engine.

Greenville, S. C., Oct. 1.—Maggie Patterson, an 8-year-old negro girl, was run over and fatally injured by a shifting engine on the Charleston and Western Carolina railroad track. The girl was playing under a car and as the engine was coupled she attempted to escape, but fell, the wheels passing over her legs.

Culvert Falls; Stonemason Killed.

Knoxville, Tenn., Oct. 2.—The work supporting the arch of a stone culvert being constructed on the Knoxville, LaFollette and Jellico railroad, near here, fell yesterday afternoon. Frank Weaver, a carpenter and stonemason, of London, Ky., was instantly killed in the accident.

ATLANTA INTERURBAN RAILWAY.

Capital and Marietta To Be Connected by Electric Line.

Atlanta, Oct. 2.—Atlanta and Marietta are to be connected within a short time by two electric lines. The Atlanta Interurban Railway company, which has just been organized in Atlanta, is actively at work on its road to Marietta and yesterday afternoon the board of county commissioners, in called session, granted a franchise to the Atlanta and Marietta Electric Railway company to operate through Fulton county an electric road between this city and the Cobb county capital. Officials of this company announce that they propose to begin work at once on the line.

The two electric lines will operate through different sections of Fulton and Cobb counties. It is not known just where the roads will enter the city, neither one having yet applied to the city for a franchise. It is expected, however, that the Atlanta Interurban road will come into the city temporarily over the river line of the Georgia Railway and Electric company.

Three officials of the Atlanta and Marietta road appeared before the county commissioners yesterday afternoon and after the franchise had been passed on by the board it was announced that they will accept it.

Those officials are Frank L. Cooke, of New York, president; Colonel W. B. Power, of Marietta, attorney; and B. M. Hall, of Atlanta, engineer. The company is required to give a bond of \$10,000 as an evidence of good faith and to liquidate any possible damages and it is stated that the bond will be made within the next few days.

FRANCHISE TAX LAW.

It Adds Millions to Taxable Property of Georgia.

Atlanta, Oct. 2.—Thus far the franchise tax law has added \$11,695,752.25 in property values upon which revenue is paid to the state of Georgia. There are still four franchises to be arbitrated, the aggregate assessments of which amount to the sum of \$5,288,000, and make a possible total of \$17,078,752.25.

The franchises yet to be arbitrated are:

The Savannah Street Railway company, assessed at \$1,430,000; the Atlanta and West Point railroad, assessed at \$1,600,000; the Georgia Railway and Electric company, assessed at \$2,200,000, and the Atlanta Belt Railroad company, assessed at \$93,000.

Of these the Savannah Street Railroad company is to be taken up by the arbitration board on Oct. 5 and the Georgia Railway and Electric company on Oct. 8, with the others soon to follow.

In many instances the assessment of Comptroller General Wright has been cut to pieces by arbitration boards and it is the opinion of many of the state officials that in some instances corporations have escaped paying taxes on anything like the real value of their franchises. However, the total amount of property added to the revenue resources of the state is vast.

SUB-COMMISSION NAMED.

Experienced Educators Will Select Series of School Books.

Atlanta, Oct. 2.—The school book commission has named a sub-commission of experienced educators. It is hoped that between those bodies a satisfactory series of books will be selected.

All subjects are important; but some are universally considered of paramount interest. The act itself recognizes this in providing (Section 2) against the adoption of books containing "anything of a vulgar or sectarian character." This applies especially to readers and histories. Comptroller General Wright has already done excellent service in disclosing objectionable matter in some books offered. But, readers and histories may be unfair indirectly, without an objectionable line. They may slight or ignore southern life, authorship, heroism and statesmanship. Of the two, the latter are perhaps the more obnoxious.

Lockout Lasted Seven Months.

Chicago, Oct. 2.—After a lockout of over seven months the 600 employees of the plant of the American Corn Products company, known as the Chicago Glucose factory, will go back to work under union conditions with union pay and hours. The difficulty arose over the company locking out its men and closed its plant behind the first firm in Chicago to take that course. In the long fight which has followed, both sides have become wearied, and the steam power council has had no trouble in securing a settlement.

Steamship Company Wins Fight.

San Francisco, Oct. 2.—The China Commercial Steamship company, operating steamers to the port, has won out in its fight for the right to land Chinese coolie laborers in Mexico. The news of the intention of the Mexican government to permit the Chinese to land on its soil has just been received by steamship officials in this city.

September Emigration Statistics.

New York, Oct. 2.—Statistics for September show that 47,852 aliens arrived at Ellis island during the month, being an excess over the corresponding month last year of 5,543. October opened with the arrival of 8,013 for the first two days.
