Gen. Edward McCrary, a distinguished lawyer of Charleston, died at his home in that city, last Sunday morning, suddenly, from heart disease. He was a gallant soldier and a brilliant man. His greatest bequest to posterity is his history of South Carolina. He was several times elected to the State legislature from his county and introduced, and supported several measures of interest to the state, especially the election and registration laws and the bill establishing a bureau of Confederate records.

Grand Jury Presentment.
 To the Honorable, the Presiding Judge:
 We, the Grand Jury, beg to make this our final presentment:
 First: We have passed on all the bills handed us by the Solicitor, and have rendered such returns thereon as, in our judgment each case required.

Second: Our committee appointed at a previous term of court has completed the investigation of the books in the offices of the County Treasurer and County Commissioners and we are able to report them correct from a clerical point of view.

Third: We recommend that the county delegation in the Legislature endeavor to have passed a "vagrant" law similar to the one now in operation in the state of Georgia.

Fourth: We are pleased to note that for the most part our recommendations have been duly respected and efforts have been made to carry them out—the most notable exception being that part of our recommendation made at the July term of court in reference to the money illegally paid out to the County Commissioners, as Special Commissioners, in laying off roads. We are grieved to note the very serious misconception placed thereon by the official designated to carry out this recommendation and urge him to take up the matter in the way it was intended, and we urge our successors to see that it is done.

Fifth: We recommend that the County Commissioners look into the advisability of securing the free passage on Keowee river, near the mouth of Twelve Mile river.

We take occasion to thank the Presiding Judge, His Honor, Chas. G. Dantzler, for his concise and lucid explanations of the law applicable to the cases before us, and the efficient and able officers of the court for their generous and united assistance.
