ALL OVER THE HOUSE.

Housekeepers Should Remember That Health is of Prime Importance.

The busy housekeeper, whose time is mostly spent indoors, should devote five minutes each morning, noon and night to simple exercises in order to develop the muscles and ward off weariness and disease. A correct standing position—head up, chin in, chest up, hips back—should be practiced always, even when washing dishes. It will soon become a habit, and adds more elegance to appearance than any amount of money spent in fine clothes. Deep breathing should be practiced almost constantly. Have always an abundance of fresh air and all the sunlight you can possibly admit to your rooms.

Housework is excellent exercise if one goes about it in the right way. Have the sink and cooking table so high that you need not bend over when at work. If one constantly stands or sits in a stooping position the internal organs become crowded, and disease is often the result, says the Woman's Home Companion. Remember that good housekeeping is easy housekeeping, and no woman need wear herself out. Her health is of prime importance when the happiness and comfort of a family depend on her. The woman who does her work alone must plan systematically and study to save time and strength in order to have the recreation necessary to the well being of every one. Instead of spending time and good material in making pies, cakes, etc., which often impair the digestion, study rather the simplest foods, which can be prepared with less labor and are valuable to repair waste.

Mats For Hot Dishes.


The common custom of using mats under hot dishes as a protection to the polished wood does not appeal to a housewife as giving an air of daintiness to a prettily set dining table, and we suggest a pretty idea for table mats. Cut a round or oblong piece of linen the size desired and embroidered with sprays of flowers of a conventional design, then cut two pieces half as large for the under side. Place the two straight edges together, which should be on the selvage at the middle across the center. When placed in this manner they are the size of the upper piece, and both should be basted together and a scallop worked around the edge through the top and under side. Now you have a mat with an opening in the center, into which you can slip a piece of asbestos cut the shape of the linen, only a trifle smaller. When the mat needs laundering slip out the asbestos and launder same as doilies.—Chicago News.

How to Make Koumiss.

"To make koumiss," says a writer in Good Housekeeping, "take one quart of blood warm new milk—fresh from the cow, if possible—two teaspoonfuls of granulated sugar, one-third of a cake of compressed yeast and a pinch of salt. Stir well and bottle at once. Leave the bottles in a warm temperature, about 70 degrees, for twelve hours; then place on the ice for twelve hours, when it is ready for use. I always use siphon bottles such as carbonated waters come in. Beer bottles are next best, but any bottle or jug will do if tightly corked."


