Notice to Merchants.

Section 610 of the Criminal Code of this State is as follows:

'No person or corporation within the limits of this State shall sell or offer for sale any pistol, rifle cartridges or pistol cartridge less than 45 calibre, or metal knuckles, without first obtaining a license from the county in which such person or corporation is doing business so to do. The county board of commissioners of the several counties of the State are authorized to issue licenses in their respective. counties for the sale of pistols and pistol and rifle cartridges of less than 45 calibre, and metal knuckles, upon the payment to the County Treasurer by the person or corporation so applying for said license of the sum of twenty-five who shall sell or offer for sale any pistol, or pistol or rifle cartridge of less than 45 calibre, or metal knuckles, without having obtained the license provided for in this section shall be guilty of a misdomeanor, and on conviction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding tive hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both, at the discretion of the court.'

All persons or corporations in Pickens county now selling or having for sale any pistol, pistol or rifle cartridge, less than 45 calib:e, or metal knuckles, are notified to procure a license on or before the 16th day of May, 1905.

The magistrates of the county are instructed to inspect all places after Hay the 16th and enforce the provisions of the above section against any and all persons or corporations not having a license.
