The Case of Stiles Moore.

At the hour of going to press last Thursday, the case of the State vs. Stiles Moore, charged with rape, had just been opened, and no account could be given of it

However, on account of the sickness of Mr. E. L. Herendon, one of the attorneys for the defense, the case did not proceed very far in detail before the court adjourned until Friday morning at 9 o'clock. At that hour court convened; at 11:15 a. m. the testimony was all in and E. L. Herneon Esq. opened the argument for the detense. Speeches were also made by Senator J. R Earle and Major Wm. J. Stribling, and at 4:55 Solicitor J. E. Boggs closed the argument for the State.

His Honor, Judge George E. Prince then charged the jury upon every point of the law touching up on the case, and the jury retired to their room. After being out all night, at an early hour Saturday morning they announced that the following verdict had been reached: "Guilty of rape with carnal knowledge of a female child under 14 years and over 10 years of age, with recommendation to the mercy of the Court." Consequently the punishment would naturally be light, and Judge Prince imposed a sentence of 14 years at hard labor in the State Penitentiary.

The crime for which Stiles Moore was charged was one of the most beinous and revolting ever recorded for trial in the grand old State of South Carolina.

A mere child, with neither father ner mother, and so far as we know, no other relatives to love and care for, to direct and lead in the paths of right and virtue, has been subjected to the most cruel treatment by one who, above all else, should have given her that fatherly love, affection, care and guidance that is due from Lim who has brought shame and disgrace, to say nothing of the misery and suffering through which she had

with the infant babe in her arms, the man who had caused her to be placed in a position of helplessness, even more so than before the crime was committed.

That Stiles Moore has had a fair and impartial trial, every one attending court will freely admit. and quoting Judge Prince, he should feel very grateful to his expart counsel, that his neck will not be broken .

It is to be hoped that at the expiration of the fourteen years Stiles Moore can return to the wife of his bosom, who has been so faithful and true to him throughout his confinement in the county jail, and also during the trial, is better man, a better citizen and a truer husband.
