Interesting Letter From Idaho.

Spencer, Idaho, July 2.—I give the readers of the Sentinel-Journal a few dots from the lava peaks of the Rockies.

Our private office is now nine thousand feet above sea level and we are still headed up. With the game we find and kill—mutton and veal, fish, etc.—we are doing well.

Our shearing season is over with an extra good crop of both wool and lambs, and the high price for these products makes it fine for the sheep man. The range was never better and all stock are doing well.

We have had an unusual wet spring and crops of all kinds are good throughout the country. Haying and harvest is well on in some sections.

There has been a large immigration to Idaho during the last six months and most all are well pleased with the country. When they are sure to locate; they sometimes go to other parts looking for something better, but in most cases they return, satisfied with this country. We would like to see more of the boys from Pickens county here, and will say to them there is a good chance for them here. Almost anything you are looking for is here—good chances for business of any kind, farming, stock raising, mining, and the finest country to prospect in this side of Alaska.

Wages are good at anything you go at, from \$30 to \$100 per month or \$3.50 per day in the mines. I saw Ivy Kelley yesterday, a Pickens county boy. When asked how he liked it he said: "This is a long ways ahead of hoeing cotton on a new ground." He is doing well.

There are thousands of acres of fine land in the Snake River valley. All it wants is water to irrigate it, and since the government has taken it in hand thousands of acres have been taken up and put into cultivation. Nice towns and hundreds of homes have sprung up. Under the government canals apples, peaches, pears, prunes, strawberries and vegetables grow

qual to California, wheat, oats and barley grow 40 to 60 bushels per acre.

Our state is getting dotted with sugar factories, and the sugar beet is a great industry and growing fast. The yield of beets per acre is from eight to fourteen tons, and the factories pay \$1.50 per ton delivered on board cars or at the factory.
