### THE TEACHER'S CLUB HAD A FINE MEETING

Prof. W. S. Morrison of Clemson Made a Very Interesting Talk on History

The Teachers Club of Anderson county held a splendid meeting Friday morning in the First Baptist Church. Mr. L. B. Hanna, the president of the club, had planned a most interesting program which was thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended.

The program was opened with devotional exercises conducted by Dr. John F. Vines. Mr. J. H. Watkins made the prayer.

Prof. G. W. Chambers made a short talk on the Field Day exercises. He urged all the teachers to encourage athletics in their schools. It is not necessary for them to do the instruction as Prof. Chambers and his assistants will do that, but the boys must be kept interested or the exercises will be a failure. Mr. Chambers says the boys of Anderson county should be well trained physically as well as mentally, and the best time to begin is while they are in the grammar and high schools. If the boys take advantage of the instructions given by Prof. Chambers they will be better fitted for the athletic field when they go to college. The exercises will be held Saturday January 17th, in Belton.

The Y. M. C. A. quartet gave two numbers that were thoroughly applauded by all the teachers.

The speaker of the morning, Mr. W. S. Morrison, professor of history in Clemson College, gave a very instructive talk on South Carolina history for forty years and has found that history has been greatly neglected by many teachers. He says that South Carolina has made more history and preserved less than any State in the Union. The children should be taught local history. Every school library in Anderson county should have a copy of the history of Anderson county written by Col. Slaysman of Pendleton. Prof. Morrison emphasized the fact that the study of history is the study of humanity, and that no teacher can make a success of it unless he puts his whole heart into his work.
