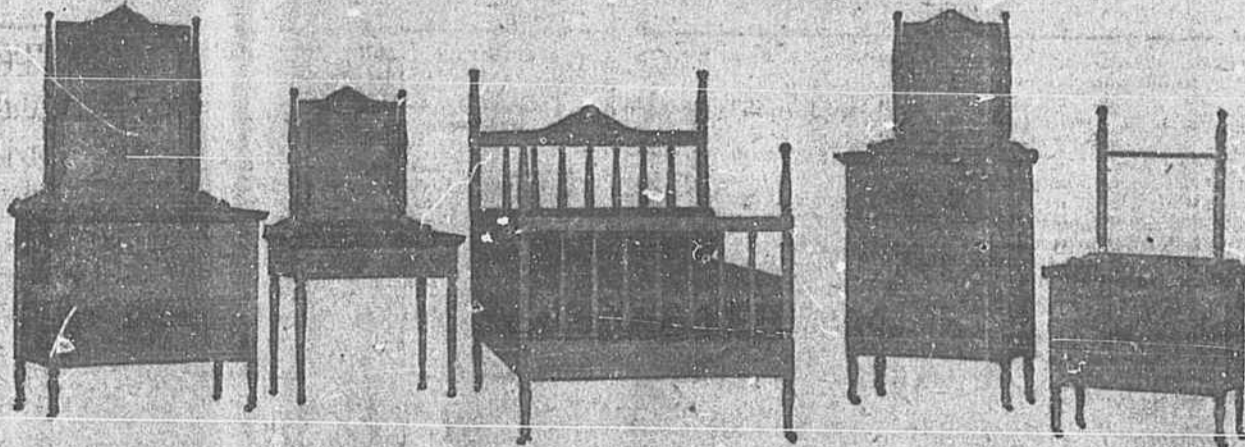

OLD ABBEVILLE ON THE HUSTLE

MAYOR GAMBRELL TELLS OF THINGS GOING ON IN HIS GOOD TOWN

HE IS PROUD OF IT

And Feels It is the City Which Offers an Opportunity For Men of Today

The Intelligencer extended to Mayor C. C. Gambrell of Abbeville the use of the columns of this paper to tell its readers of the developments and the prospects of the beautiful city of which Dr. Gambrell is the executive, and he is a live one. His reply is as follows:

Dear Sir: The city of Abbeville, S. C., is situated on the Seaboard Air Line and Southern Railways and is a division point of the former road, being 138 miles from Atlanta, Ga., and about the same distance from Monroe, N. C. The Seaboard has shops at this place. The city has a population of about 4,800 and is steadily growing.

The surrounding country is fertile and easily cultivated, making large crops of cotton, corn, small grain, in fact everything in the way of farm and truck products.

This is the county seat and the principal market of the county, about 17,000 bales of cotton being sold here market price.

We have an \$800,000 cotton mill, oil mill, two large gineries, lumber yards, bottling works, wholesale grocery, and a number of small industries.

The city owns and operates the water and electric plant and furnishes consumers with light, power and water at a very low rate, the water supply is from a number of springs and is absolutely pure; this fact, and the fine sanitary situation of the city and a complete sewer system account for the healthfulness of the place.

Our school system is up-to-date in every respect, having a full corps of competent teachers; we have a graded and high school, the buildings for the same costing nearly \$10,000. Tuition is free to residents.

We have sixteen passenger trains daily and freight trains almost hourly these giving all the travelling and freight facilities necessary.

The hotels of the city are first-class. The traveler finds a hearty welcome, and "bed and board" of which he will not complain. Our largest hotel has just been thoroughly overhauled and refurnished, having hot and cold water in every room and all of the latest improvements. The hotels and boarding houses fully sustain the reputation of Abbeville as "The city for good eats."

The merchants of the city are wide awake, obliging and carry complete stocks of goods in their respective lines. No need to go elsewhere for what you want to wear, to eat, to furnish the home, to stock your supply the farm, or to get the luxuries of life; our merchants will fill the bill. Ample fire protection is furnished by a fully equipped fire department, and an ample supply of water. The police force is the very best, taking care of the lawbreakers, which we must say are few.

Handsome houses of worship of the Methodist, Presbyterian, Baptist, A. R. Presbyterian, Episcopal and Roman Catholic denominations give ample opportunity for worship.

We need cotton mills, warehouse, knitting mill, overall factory, in fact this is the place for the manufacturer, as we have a healthy city, mild climate, splendid surrounding country, first-class schools, churches of all the principal denominations, opera house, three banks with a combined capital stock of \$172,000, and surplus profits of \$85,000.

All manufacturing establishments in the city limits, whose capital stock is \$5,000 or more, are exempt from all city license and taxes, except for school purposes, and except upon assessed value of real estate held by such manufacturers.

During this year a great deal of improvement by the city has been made in the way of putting down concrete sidewalks, building bridges, and re-grading our streets. At the water and light plant a large new generator has been put in, and the steam plant thoroughly overhauled, and we are now in shape to take care of the light and power of the city in case there should be some accident to put the power plants that furnish the city with electric current out of commission.

The new government post office building, costing \$50,000, is finished and in use. In this building we have one of the handsomest, most conveniently situated and elegantly furnished public buildings in the State.

A white way installed last June lights our public square most beautifully. This improvement was the result of contributions from our citizens and is a splendid monument to their liberality and public spirit.

These are only a few of the many improvements in our city during this year.

Come to Abbeville to succeed. Our city is now in a new era, and has not been changed in several years.

SCHOOL NOTES.

A New Slogan "An Academy For Anderson's Boys."

The spring term of the Anderson Fitting School opened with several new students, the total enrollment now amounting to sixty-six.

The head master, Dr. W. H. Frazer, hopes to enlarge the boarding facilities of the institution. It is his desire to enroll a number sufficient to justify an enlargement of the present building or the building of new quarters. It is hoped that the proposition offered by the North Anderson Development Company, under the management of Mr. John Lingley, will be accepted by the board of directors of the school.

The citizens of Anderson have shown their generosity in the promotion of the Anderson College, for the girls; why not launch a campaign for an institution suitable for the boys? With the enthusiasm that is now prevalent among the citizens of Anderson county, in the present period of prosperity; it seems that an academy for boys would promote the interest, now shown by the cry for, a greater Anderson.

The head master, Dr. Frazer, has added to the school, the military feature. It is meeting with great success, under his able instruction. The students are showing up well in their new role, while an undercurrent of enthusiasm is prevalent among the young soldiers.

The student body has been divided into two companies, the officers are as follows; Dr. W. H. Frazer, head master, commandant, Mr. Prue Sloan, major; Mr. Theo King, captain company A; Mr. Tom Cherry, captain company B; the officers hope to make the two companies the best trained in the State not withstanding the poor facilities for giving each student the proper outfit.
