CAPT. JOHN C. CALHOUN ON A VISIT LAST WEEK

Capt. John C. Calhoun grandson of the great statesman of the same name, was here on a visit last week accompanied by his son, Mr. Jas. E. Calhoun. They visited the home of Mrs. M. C. Dickson, the widow of a war time comrade of Capt. Calhoun. The distinguished visitor talked quite a while here and said among other things that if the State of South Carolina would take over Clemson College and change the name to Calhoun College he would see that a school be endowed to the extent of \$1,000,000. The college here is the only one in the State. Mr. Calhoun and it has long been a matter of speculation who the great grandson of the great statesman should not bear Calhoun's name. The management of the college is vested in a board consisting of eight life trustees, appointed by the Clemson estate and self-perpetuated, and seven trustees elected by the State legislature. It is said that \$100,000 would cover the maintenance of the college by Mr. Calhoun.

Mr. Calhoun is very much interested in this country. He praised the splendid spirit of the people of this section. Some of the local live wires endeavored to get him interested in financing a hotel proposition here, and Mr. Calhoun has the matter under consideration. Some local friends were invited to join him in Charleston on a fishing trip. Capt. Calhoun had been to Clemson College and left here for Abbeville, the native county of his grandfather. This was his first visit in 35 years.
