

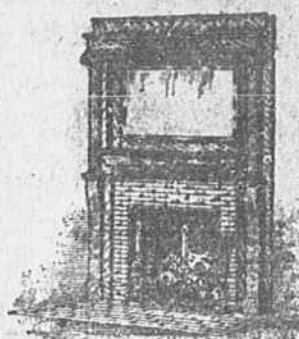
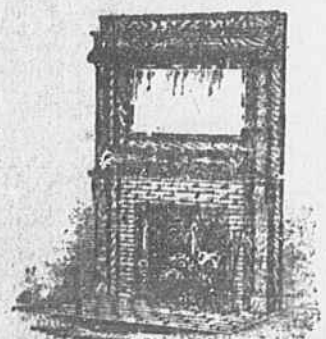
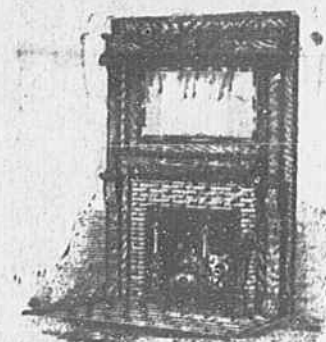

FAVORS CHANGE OF THE WHISKEY LAWS

Magistrate From Home Path Would Place Whiskey Selling in Lower Court

Magistrate C. E. Clement, of Home Path township, was among the interesting visitors in the city yesterday. Mr. Clement discussed with a reporter the Intelligencer a new plan for handling the whiskey trial; and said that he believed a system of authorizing the magistrates to try the whiskey cases would prove to be the means of preventing many of them from ever going into the circuit court.

If this could be done it would not only save the county a great deal of expense but at the same time it would prevent the long delay which now ensues. On the docket of every county center in the State will be found hundreds of whiskey cases which have been carried from term to term, waiting until they could receive the attention of the court. This is through no fault of the court officials; it is an impossibility to give immediate attention to the numerous cases of violation of the dispensary law and accordingly these cases frequently hang on for months, some times for a year or more.

the matter yesterday, said that the cases could be tried by the magistrates if the penalty were lowered and said that while this would seem to be losing money it would indirectly save money for the county since the trial in the court of general sessions, when it is finally reached, is necessarily very expensive.

In all probability Mr. Clement will present his plan to the members of the general assembly from Anderson county and ask that they take under advisement the introduction of a law which would provide for such a procedure.

SHORTER ROUTE TO GEORGIA TOWN

Would Have Ferry Established On Savannah River to Make Distance Shorter

Stating that he would cheerfully contribute for the purpose that part of the route traversing his property, E. C. Meschine has written a letter to Porter Whaley, secretary of the Anderson Chamber of Commerce in which he asks that the proposition of placing a ford on the Savannah river to make a direct route from Anderson to Elberton, Ga., be given consideration. In his letter Mr. Meschine says that there was formerly a ferry known as Bowman's ferry which was located between Harper's ferry and Gregg Shoals and that by this means it made a much more direct trip to Elberton, shortening the distance and proving to be a great convenience to those people who had occasion to make the trip.

He states that a charter could be secured from the State of South Carolina for this ferry if the matter were taken up with the members of the General Assembly from Anderson county and says that Georgia would have to respect it if such were issued. He points as his authority for this statement to Vol. I, section 2, of the South Carolina Code of Laws.

In this letter Mr. Meschine says that if he can furnish half of the right of way for such undertaking that the State of Georgia would certainly furnish the other half and assures the Secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce that it would be for the good of the people of this section to have such a move put on foot. He urges that immediate steps may be taken in order that the movement might be perfected before the present session of the General Assembly is concluded.

When asked as to his personal opinion concerning the matter, Mr. Whaley said that he had had no time in which to consider it and that he could not express any conclusion as yet.

NIGHT SCHOOL HAD A FLYING START

Opened Last Night in Quarters of Cecil Business School. Good Enrollment

A movement which must prove for the betterment of Anderson was launched last night when the Y. M. C. A. night school for boys was inaugurated. This school has been started in the hope that those boys who are forced to labor during the day may have an opportunity to acquire some education and judging from all indications the boys and the young men of the city are willing to avail themselves of the opportunity thus presented.

The school opened last night in the splendid quarters of Cecil's Business school with an enrollment of 13. The students say that so far as they are concerned the joint facts of the school opening on the 13th of the month and the enrollment reaching the 13 mark will prove to be more of an omen of good luck than it will ill-fortune.

Prof. Riser, principal of the Anderson High School, has active charge of the work and this instructor is going to leave nothing undone that can be done to make the school a success. He is assisted in his efforts by Director Barrett of the Y. M. C. A.

It is planned to hold two sessions of the night school each week, one on Tuesday and one on Thursday night and the school will open promptly at 7:30 o'clock on these evenings. It is confidently expected that by next Thursday night the present enrollment will be swelled to possibly twice the number present at the roll call last night.

Messrs. Barnett and Riser deserve to be commended for their efforts in this direction and the work they are doing should be appreciated by the people of Anderson generally and especially by the young men for whom the work is destined to accomplish much.

NOTICE OF COUNTY TREASURER.

The books of the County Treasurer will be opened for the collection of State, County and School taxes for the fiscal year, 1913, and Commutation Road taxes for the fiscal year 1914, at the Treasurer's office from Oct. 15th to December 31st, 1913. After December 31st, one per cent penalty will be added; after January 31st, two per cent penalty will be added and after February 28th seven per cent penalty will be added till the 15th day of March, 1914, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one township or school district, are requested to call for receipts in EACH TOWNSHIP OR SCHOOL DISTRICT in which the property is located. On account of having so many school districts, this request is very important to the tax-payers and will to a large extent eliminate extra costs and penalties.

The State constitution requires of all male persons between the ages of 21 and 60 years, except those incapable of earning a support from being maimed or other causes, and those who served in the war between the States, to pay a poll tax of one dollar. All male persons between the ages of 21 and 50 years of age who are able to work the public roads, or cause them to be worked, except preachers who have charge of a congregation and persons who served in the war between the States, school teachers and trustees, who are exempted from real duty may in lieu of that, pay a tax of one dollar, to be collected at the same time other taxes are collected.

Prompt attention will be given all persons who wish to pay their taxes through the mails by check, money order, etc.

The Code of Laws of 1912 fixes the commutation Road Tax for Anderson County at two dollars (\$2.00) and unless this is changed by the Legislature, the Treasurer will have to collect this amount.
