FIELD DAY TO BE HELD HERE

ANDERSON SCHOOLS WILL COMPETE IN THE SPRING

MANY CONTESTS

Arrangements Now Being Made For Great Fair to Be Held In Anderson

Plans are now being made for the first Anderson county field day and the indications are that if the arrangements now being made do not miscarry it will be one of the most successful events of its kind to take place in any county of the State.

J. B. Felton, superintendent of education for Anderson county, has issued the following open letter to teachers, trustees and patrons of the public schools: "We are planning to have Field Day in Anderson next spring. We can do nothing without your help. The success of the occasion depends on you."

"These exercises are held for the purpose of stimulating an interest in spelling, geography, arithmetic, in athletics and in home economics, such as sewing, bread making, the making of tables, shelves, baskets, etc. Prof. Tate says: 'The teacher who works the small, isolated school sometimes looks upon her task as insignificant; but it assumes a new dignity and importance when she has a chance to see it in its relation to the larger county system. The school spirit of the boy from the Pine Grove or Long Canoe school takes on a different meaning after he has marched behind his school banner in the county Field Day parade and has seen the representative of his school take honors in the spelling match or in the 100-yard dash. Such reasons as these caused 25 counties in South Carolina to organize county school fairs or field days, or both of these county enterprises, last year.'"

The superintendent calls attention in this letter to the fact that even country spelling matches contribute to the progress of a school by reason of the fact that it stimulates a friendly rivalry and requests that every school in preparation for the field day conduct contests at intervals in this line and prepare to make the final selection of the school's best speller by the last of March. He also urges that the teachers have map drawing contests in order that each of the schools may be represented in this line when the wheel comes and has a similar arrangement for contests in arithmetic to be settled on field day.

One especially pleasing feature of the day is the enormous picnic dinner which is now being planned. A long table will be spread, at which all guests can be cared for, and the affair will be of the nature of a "community dinner."

The athletic features of the day are being stressed and Mr. Felton says that he is sure there will be a number of entries in the various events. These are to include 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash, 440-yard run, 880-yard run, 1-mile run, shot put, high jump, broad jump, discus throw and pole vault.

There is also to be an exhibit of children's work and the superintendent desires that the teachers send these in by the middle of February in order that Miss Maggie M. Garlington, supervisor of rural schools, may take them to the State Teachers Association which meets in Spartanburg on March 19. Among the various items which figure in the contest will be the best pound of butter, best school lunch, loaf of bread, best 888,419 lb. year, and of all other. These articles will be exhibited by the schools that have a department of domestic science. For those schools having no such department, but in the line of domestic art will be contests for the best rug, cotton-wool, darning socks, patches, household aprons, crochet lace, tatting and embroidery.

Contests are also to be arranged for the department of manual training and prizes will be awarded for the best axe handle, hammer handle, cotton basket, willow lunch basket, shuck door mat, picture frame, plain mission book shelf and kitchen table.

Numerous other articles are provided for in the list of articles which has been mapped out by Mr. Felton and Miss Garlington and they urge schools at once begin to interest their pupils in the venture. Mr. Felton said yesterday that he had considerable literature at his office, explaining the work of the field day and that he would be pleased to have every teacher in the county call or send for one.

He urges that no time be lost in beginning to prepare for the event as much time will be necessary for the pupils to do the best work on which they are capable.

At the solicitation of Adjutant Chas. C. Langston of Camp W. W. Humphries, United Sons of Confederate Veterans, a sum of money has just been raised by the veterans and their friends for the purpose of caring for the immediate wants and to

BUILDINGS ARE DILAPIDATED

The Intelligencer has received a communication from Dr. J. C. Mitchell, commissioner of health in which that official points out the fact that the city has entirely too many dilapidated buildings. He says that quite a number of the buildings, some within the heart of the city, have reached the point where they are hardly less than a disgrace and urges that some action be taken by the owners in various quarters. Some of the buildings according to the Health Commissioner should be improved and remodeled, while he takes the position that others are not worth improving and should be removed.
