Financial and Commercial

New York Cotton

New York, Jan. 24.—Renewal of yesterday's selling caused an early decline in cotton, but prices later rallied on bullish Southern spot advices and covering, with the close very steady at a net advance of 1 to 4 points. Cables were lower than due and it was reported that yesterday's break in raw material had checked the demand for cotton yarns, but the chief selling here on the opening decline of 4 to 9 points seemed to be on overnight orders, inspired by the break of the previous day and the bearish view of spinning figures. Offerings were well taken around the opening prices, which showed a reaction of some 25 to 30 points from high levels of the week and the market soon became steadier.

New Orleans Cotton

New Orleans, Jan. 24.—After a few opening today the cotton market recovered and went to a net advance. The ring was not active in the early trading, and much of the business done was the result of the desire of longs to even up over the weekend. Later, however, the market acquired a firm undertone, the ring became active and a good volume of business came in, much of it being the result of fresh buying for long accounts. This switching of sentiment was caused, in no small measure, by reports from states in the western belt that seed for planting was too poor to be of any use. Reports from Texas were that the situation in this respect was serious. Traders were at first inclined to sell because of rains, but later turned into buyers on the poor seed complaints.

Cotton Seed Oil

New York, Jan. 24.—The cotton seed oil market was quiet today, but prices were steadier owing to buying by leading commission houses and firms in the lard and crude markets, closing 2 points net lower to 3 higher.

Cotton Goods

New York, Jan. 24.—Cotton goods market ruled quiet and steady today. Men's wear prices were irregular. Yarn are in better demand. Linens for quick delivery sold well. Dur-laps continued weak.

Chicago Grain and Provisions

Chicago, Jan. 24.—Assertions that the wheat crop in Argentina would be only about 70 per cent of last year's crop had a bullish effect on today's market. The market closed firm 1/2 to 3/4 above last night. Corn gained 1/2 to 3/4 net and oats, 1/4 to 1/2 net. Provisions: The outcome was unchanged 2 to 3 higher.
