SENATOR NICHOLSON'S BILL FOR PURIFYING ELECTIONS

The Measure Which Will Excite the Most Fighting in the General Assembly at this Session

The main provision of the Nicholson primary reform bill around which centers the political interests of this session of the general assembly is contained in the following summary from the bill, as printed in the senate journal:

"In each year, five months before the first primary or any primary election held by any political party, organization or association for the purpose of choosing candidates for office, there shall be the duty of the members and officers of each club to provide for the enrollment in alphabetical order, of all the persons entitled to vote at such club in the primary elections of such political party, organization or association, as hereinafter provided. All persons who are qualified to vote in such primary elections under the constitution and rules of such political party, organization or association, and who are bona fide citizens of the state and of the United States, and who have been residents of this state for one year, and of the township or ward three months before the first primary election of such party, organization or association of any year in which an election shall be held, shall be entitled to be enrolled on such club roll. Provided, that each such voter applying for enrollment on any such club roll shall take an oath that he is duly qualified to vote in such election under the constitution and rules of said party, organization or association and under the provisions of this chapter, and that he is not enrolled as a member of any other club, and state his age and place of residence, and if in a city where the houses are numbered, the number of the residence in which he resides, and if the houses are not numbered, he shall state the street and block upon which he lives, and shall be complying with said terms, be enrolled.

charge of the enrollment of the voters at each of the clubs or precincts to make out a copy of the club roll of such precinct, and to certify under oath before a notary public, or other officer authorized to administer oaths under the laws of this state that the same is a true and correct copy of the club roll of such club, and shall file such certified copy with the clerk of court of the county in which such precinct is located, and the same shall be kept on record in his office. "No person shall be allowed to vote at any primary election whose name is not enrolled on the club roll of the precinct where he is entitled to vote under the constitution and rules of such political party, organization or association, in accordance with the provisions of this chapter, at least 30 days before the first primary election of such party, organization or association in each year in which an election shall be held.

"Any person applying for enrollment on the club roll of any club or precinct of any political party, organization or association, who shall be refused enrollment, shall have the right to appeal to any circuit judge in the circuit where such voter resides, or to any justice of the Supreme Court from the action of the officers of such club; provided that the notice and grounds of appeal be served on one of the officers of such club within five days after the action of said club in refusing to enroll such voter, and this appeal shall be heard within 10 days from the date of service of such notice, and the time and place for the hearing of said appeal shall be fixed and designated in such notice; and such person, or the officers or members of such club shall have the right to appeal to the Supreme Court of South Carolina from the decision of the Judge or Justice who hears the same; Provided, that in the event of action of the club or precinct in refusing to enroll such persons be reversed by the Judge or Justice who hears the appeal, then the name of such person shall be placed on the

roll of such club and he shall be entitled to vote as a member of such club pending the final decision of the Supreme Court.

Existing Club Rolls. "All existing club rolls are hereby declared null and void, and before any act may be done each club shall be reorganized and a chairman and secretary elected. The County Executive committee and the officers of the club as at present constituted in the various counties shall be authorized to act in order to carry out any of the provisions of this act.

That an executive committee of every such political party or organization or association, shall be provided by such political party, organization or association for each county of the State, to be composed of one member of each club or precinct, and a chairman to be selected under the constitution and rules of such party, organization or association; and it shall be the duty of the executive committee to meet at the court house in the respective counties 30 days before the first primary in each election year. And the said committee shall have access to the club rolls filed in the office of the clerk of court, and shall have power to hear objections on the part of any citizen to any of said club rolls, and if there shall be found on said club rolls the names of any persons not entitled to vote in any of the precincts, and if it shall be found that the names of any person entitled to vote have been omitted, the said committee shall have the power to correct the club rolls, and to strike from them or add to them all such names after giving the persons and officers of clubs affected five days' notice to show cause why the same should not be done. Provided, that the committee shall not notify the persons affected and the officers of any club or precinct of any change made in the club roll, within five days thereafter, and the persons stricken from said club rolls or the officers of such club shall have the same right and method of appeal from the action of the executive committee as is provided in Section 282-d of this act.

"Any person violating the provisions of this act other than swearing falsely shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and fined not over five hundred dollars (\$500.) or both at the discretion of the court. Any person swearing falsely in any matters pertaining to primary elections shall be guilty of perjury and punished as now provided by law for perjury. The officers and managers of all clubs, and members of the State and county executive committees of political parties, organizations or associations are hereby authorized to administer oaths in all matters relating to such primary elections, and to swear falsely before an officer touching such matters shall be perjury. The said managers shall be sworn to conduct the election fairly and legally, and each voter shall be sworn as to his right to vote and that he has not voted before at said election."

Live Stock Association Will Attract Many to Columbia in February

In all probability a number of Anderson people will attend the event and it is hoped that many of them will this year, as has become a custom with Anderson people, win a number of prizes.
