SCORES CHURCHES; PRAISES THE ARMY

Capt. Mabee Says That Salvation Army Has to Do Work of the Church.

Many of those who heard Capt. W. B. Mabee of the Salvation Army, speak at the court house last night, said that the effort was one of the strongest and the address one of the most pleasing. That they had ever heard. Capt. Mabee made a great impression upon his hearers and he gave them a clearer insight and a better understanding of what the Salvation Army has done, is doing and hopes to do, than any of them had ever had before. It was a magnificent effort.

The speaker said that when the present plan of work was first conceived no one thought of what immense proportions it might ultimately attain. He said that 45 years ago the entire Salvation Army plan was under the hat of one man and that man was working in the famous White-chapel neighborhood of London. He soon found it necessary to feed the men who flocked to him for assistance and for giving assistance and then was originated the army which has flourished like a green bay tree until it is now found in 69 countries and officers to the number of 16,000 are located in all parts of the world. The local officers of the army who correspond to the officials of a church, reach a sum total of over 50,000. The Salvation Army has 25,000 hands, which give their time free for furnishing music to aid the order and the soldiers, recruits and adherents of the order must reach well up into the millions, although Capt. Mabee said that he did not have any definite figures at hand.

He then took up the question of the great difficulties encountered in the work, referring to the fact that the great body of workers come from the saloons and other lowly walks of life, though there are many recruits in the ranks from the cultured classes. Another difficulty which has been encountered, according to Capt. Mabee, is the slowness with which the officers and leaders of the work grasp the ideas and leads of the work. He said that much more could be accomplished in a much shorter length of time if it were possible to make an would, but said that the churches end upon the minds of the leaders in stead of many repetitions being necessary.

He said that all told there are only about 25 wealthy people in the order and said that the Salvation Army is typically of and for the poor people of the world.

He upbraided the people of the various churches for not doing the work that is being done by the Salvation Army. He said that the church, with its 40,000,000 members, with its great numbers of men and millions of dollars of wealth, could do even more than the Salvation Army has immediate impression of the desired done or can hope to do if it only would not do it and that therefore it had to be done by some other similar to the Salvation Army or be left undone. He said that the army is doing the work of the church for the church.

Rev. J. W. Speake, pastor of St. John's Methodist church, said a few words of commendation following the conclusion of Capt. Mabee's address. Mr. Speake complimented the army on what it is doing and said that the officers deserved whatever help and assistance the people and the churches could give.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. D. Witherspoon Dodge, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church.

Local workers for the Salvation Army are Ensign and Mrs. Belcher and Capt. and Mrs. Way. It is the duty of Anderson people to appreciate the great work that these people are doing and when an opportunity presents itself for them to aid, they should not be slow in grasping it.
