WOMAN'S RIGHTS ADOVOCATED CHIEF JUSTICE WALTER CLARK

Richmond, Va., Jan. 31.—Principles for which the revolutionary and civil wars were fought were invoked in the cause of woman suffrage here last night by Walter Clark, chief justice of the supreme court of North Carolina, addressing the equal suffrage league of Virginia.

"We fought the revolution on the ground of 'no taxation without representation,'" said the speaker, "yet a large part of the property of this country, probably a third, is now held by women. They are heavily taxed, yet they are denied all voice in fixing the amount of taxation and in the disposition of the vast sums which they pay into the public treasury."

"More than sixty years ago it was declared that this country 'cannot live half slave and half free.' It is equally true now that our civilization cannot progress to its ultimate triumph with half our population denied equal share and control in the conduct of the government."

"Opponents to equal suffrage were grouped by Chief Justice Clark in three classes: "Those allied with the financial interests which back the whiskey trust

"It has been well said," continued Chief Justice Clark, "that a single fact is worth a shipload of arguments."

"Southern states have fallen behind in this movement," said the speaker. "We have boasted our chivalrous regard for women, but we have not been sincere."

"We men had better do like Capt. Scott's cooking come down." Women know they are as much entitled to the ballot as we are. They have set out to get it, and we will have no rest until they get it. Men and brethren, we might as well come down."

LIVE STOCK MEN HOLD MEETING

An Interesting Program Has Been Arranged For Occasion.

BUTTER SCORING

A Number of Prizes Offered—Anderson Has Been Getting Them Heretofore.

Prof. J. M. Burgess of Clemson College, has sent The Intelligencer a program of the annual meeting of the South Carolina Stock association which is to be held in Columbia February 4, 5 and 6.

The butter contest for that occasion will be a big event. Anderson county usually shows up well, Mr. M. B. Richardson of Pendleton, having taken numerous first prizes.

Mr. Jas. L. McIntosh of Doxessville, is the president of the association and Prof. Burgess is secretary and treasurer. Among the speakers will be J. H. McClain of Washington, D. C.; A. C. Haskell of Augusta, Ga.; Alvin J. Deed of Raleigh, N. C.; R. H. Mason of Clemson College; Prof. B. S. Shields of Clemson; J. A. Kiernon of Birmingham, Ala.; Phil S. Hamer, of Taylorsville, Ill. Dr. E. M. Nighbert of Atlanta; Prof. W. W. Long of Clemson; Dr. S. S. Linder of Union; Frank C. Hare of Clemson; T. C. Moss, St. Matthews; J. T. Watt, Clemson and Dr. Sorrell of Spartanburg.

In the butter scoring contest, \$25 in cash will be divided among all contestants who receive a score of more than 90. The amount of cash will be in proportion to the score.

Other prizes will be a silver trophy cup, a barrel churn, a butter worker, a package of Wyandotte cleanser; parchment paper for wrapping butter, subscriptions to periodicals, etc.

Butter Scoring. An educational butter scoring contest will be held in connection with the meeting of the Live Stock association. Cash prizes worth \$25 will be distributed among the contestants.

The contest will be governed by the following rules:

"1. All persons who desire to enter this contest should make application at once to Prof. J. M. Burgess, secretary of the Live Stock association, Clemson College, for entry blanks, since all entries must be accompanied by the official entry blanks.

"2. An entry will consist of two or more one-pound prints of butter.

"3. The butter will be scored according to the following standard: Flavor, 45 per cent.; grain, 25 per cent.; color, 15 per cent.; salt, 1 per cent.; packing, 5 per cent.

"4. The butter must reach Columbia by 6 p. m., Tuesday, February 3; and the scoring will be done Wednesday, February 4.

"5. No contestant will be allowed to be present while the butter is being scored but the results of the contest will be announced on Wednesday, February 4, at the afternoon session of the South Carolina Live Stock association. The butter will remain on exhibition throughout the meeting of the association.

"6. Address the shipment to J. M. Burgess, Columbia. Ship by express prepaid or parcel post. The butter to receive the highest score should be carefully packed and wrapped.

"7. The butter entered in this contest will become the property of the association to help pay the expense of the contest.

"8. Butter to be entered in this contest must be made in South Carolina and on farm of contestant.

"9. No one will be allowed to make entries in more than one class.

"10. All butter that scores above 90 will receive a diploma of merit."

WALHALLA WILL SOON HAVE ELECTRIC POWER

W. A. Strother and Dr. J. W. Bell Let Contract—Large Plant at Rhett Shoals.

Walhalla, Jan. 31.—It seems quite probable that Walhalla is soon to have electric lights. Mr. W. A. Strother and Dr. J. W. Bell have let to Messrs. Quartermus & McDonald the contract for the erection of a dam on the shoals on the Rhett tract of land some five miles north-west of that town, and active work is called for in the very near future, as soon as the necessary materials can be laid down. Orders have already been placed by the contractors for the materials for the erection of the dam, which will be about 125 feet in length 12 feet in thickness at the base, 2 feet thick at the top and 15 feet high. It is said that this shoal affords an unusually good prospect for good development at a moderate cost. Both Mr. Strother and Dr. Bell are abundantly able to carry out any plans that may be necessary for the equipment of the plant. It is possible that the development will be sufficient to justify the furnishing of some current for the use of small enterprises for power purposes.

Messrs. C. W. Pitchford, of Walhalla and the Neville Brothers, of West Union have all plans made for the erection of an oil mill and ginning plant at Walhalla, having recently purchased a large front on North Broad street. The mill will be of ten ton capacity daily and the gins. A duplicate ginning plant will be under the direct supervision of the West Union ginnery to be operated by Fuchard and the Neville Brothers are numbered among the most substantial business men of Oconee, and their launching of these enterprises is operated by Mr. Strother and Mr. Palmer.
