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## LITTLE EFFECT IS APPARENT

### Lifting Embargo on the Shipment of Arms to Mexico.

## NEW QUESTIONS ARE CONSIDERED

### Problems Arise in Change of Policy by United States Government—The Rebels Are Active.

(By Associated Press.)  
Washington, Feb. 4.—There were few external signs today for the effect of yesterday's presidential proclamation revoking the order against the shipment of arms and munitions of war into Mexico. In answer to a suggestion that the work of the American border patrol would be greatly reduced in consequence of the cessation of the task of chasing "gun runners," Secretary Garrison said that he would be entirely aided by the recommendations of Gen. Bliss at San Antonio, in making changes in the disposition of troops. So far, he said, he had not considered the feasibility of making reductions.

The status of the refugee Mexican soldiers, federals and constitutionalists alike, held by the United States were not affected by the proclamation, and it was said that when order was restored, the Mexican government would be confronted with a bill for the maintenance of all refugees.

Treasury officials have charge of the large quantities of arms seized by the border patrol, and it is expected that some of them will be sold to the collectors of customs in Texas and other border States, relative to their release for shipment into Mexico.

The constitutionalists now hold most of the custom houses on the Mexican side of the international line. They can now ship arms without molestation through Brownsville, Tex.; President, Tor, El Paso, Douglas and Nogales. The federals still hold Nuevo Laredo and Piedras Negras.

Whether any shipment of arms would have to be preceded by a permit from the State department, or whether the proclamation issued by the President merely would restore the status quo, is not known.

Through recognized posts of entry was a phase of the situation which it was expected soon would be worked out by government officials.

The disposition of a large quantity of ammunition seized on the border is expected to be decided by officials of the treasury and department of justice.

## Rebels at Juarez Caught Unprepared

El Paso, Texas, Feb. 4.—An express wagon loaded with the international arms from El Paso to Juarez was the first load of munitions of war permitted to cross to the rebels under President Wilson's proclamation lifting the embargo. The wagon contained eight barrels of ammunition and two boxes of dynamite, but large quantities of fighting weapons have been ordered by rebel agents and sent out to be distributed south for the rebel attack on Torreon. ## FUNDS SOUGHT FOR CENTENARY

### Celebration of Peace Treaty Between United States and England.

London, Feb. 4.—The British committee arranging for the celebration of the centenary of peace between the United States and England, made a second appeal for funds at a meeting held today at the Mansion House. A cablegram from Secretary Bryan was read.

Frederic Asquith said that neither the British nor the American government was officially participating in the program of the celebration, because both felt that the movement should be a spontaneous act of the people of the two countries.

The archbishop of Canterbury expressed the hope that part of the fund would be devoted to educational endowments for "reducing the disproportionate share given to the separation of the United States from Great Britain in American school text books."

John A. Stewart, secretary of the American committee, reciprocated this statement with an amendment urging that the false conceptions of Americans taught in England also be corrected.

Walter H. Page, the American ambassador, also was present.

## STATE CAPITAL

Columbia, Feb. 4.—The bill permitting the Atlantic Coast Line to purchase the Charleston and Western Carolina which has passed the Senate, was introduced in the House tonight.

The bill was introduced by Representative James to require the State superintendent of education to acquire and compile a record of the teachers of the State, when it came up on third reading.

The Senate accepted an invitation yesterday by the city council of Orangeburg to make a short stop on their way to Charleston on February 11.

An unfavorable report was made by the committee on education in the Senate last night on the former bill forbidding white people to teach in negro schools. The bill has already passed the House, and its course in the Senate will be watched with great interest by the entire State.

The Senate last night passed the Weston bill providing for medical inspection of school children following a debate of several hours duration. A motion to strike out the connecting words was lost by a vote of 26 to 9. The senators voting to strike out the connecting words of the bill were: Glenn, Goodwin, Cross, Johnson, Manning, Simpson, Strait, Stanley and Williams.

The Senate last night passed the Burnett bill prescribing a literacy test for applicants to admission to the United States as passed by the House this afternoon by a vote of 241 to 125. All proposed amendments relating to the exclusion of anabolic immigrants previously had been eliminated.

Representative Barker introduced a bill for the purpose of amending the act of March 3, 1907, which authorized the Secretary of State to issue visas to foreign-born persons who had been naturalized in the United States.

The bill was introduced by Representative Barker and is now in the hands of the committee on immigration.

### Bill to Sell State Farms Passes Second Reading.

## FILIBUSTER IN THE HOUSE

### Deadlock Comes on Consideration of Sanders Bill—Senate Decides to Print Record in Christensen Case.

Columbia, Feb. 4.—After over two hours of fevered debate this morning, the House passed to third reading the McQueen bill providing for the sale of the State farms and the transfer of the convicts working on them to the chaingangs of the various counties. The bill was passed by a narrow margin after a determined fight. The measure was amended to prohibit the sinking fund commission from disposing of the land at less than \$75 an acre for both the swamp land and the hill land. Another amendment provided that only one of the State farms should be sold, but did not specify which one.

In the form in which the House passed it to third reading, the McQueen bill was a very ragged affair. It is believed that it will be very difficult to sell any of the State farms for not less than \$75 an acre.

The House sent to the Senate this morning the Stanley-Hunter-Mixon bill providing for a flat passenger rate of two cents a mile on all the railroads in the State after July 1. The vote on the question of passing the bill to the Senate, 100 yeas, 90 nays.

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## SPECTACULAR REVOLUTION

### President of Peru Was Taken Prisoner Yesterday.

## TAKEN TO CCYST FOR DEPORTATION

### Palace Was Suddenly Attacked by Military Revolutionists—Minister of War Killed in Fight.

Lima, Peru, Feb. 4.—The president of the republic of Peru, Guillermo Billinghurst, today was taken prisoner by military revolutionists. The rebels suddenly attacked the presidential palace under the leadership of Col. Benavides.

Gen. Enrique Yvarola, Premier and Minister of War, was killed in the sharp fight which ensued. Dr. Augusto Durand, former revolutionary leader, who was sought by the police yesterday, took possession of the palace. It is generally believed that he will organize a new government.

President Billinghurst was later taken by the rebels as a prisoner to Callao, whence he will be sent into exile.

The revolutionists are reported to have a single warship on the equator.

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## SUFFRAGISTS GET SET-BACK

### Failure to Get Special Committee Checks Hopes.

## STATE MATTER, SAYS CONGRESS

### Democratic Leader Underwood Declares That the Right of the Franchise Should Be Settled by States.

Washington, Feb. 4.—Hopes of woman suffrage that the present Democratic administration would see federal legislation enfranchising the women of the country were checked today when Representative Underwood of Alabama, majority leader of the house, put the Democratic party squarely on record as opposed to federal action. Representative Underwood declared that the Democratic party took the position that the question of suffrage was one which should be left to the individual States to settle.

The question cropped up in the discussion of the immigration bill in the house, and there was considerable debate as to just what the action of the Democratic house caucus in rejecting the Raker woman suffrage resolution, meant. Representative Underwood of Wisconsin declared that by defeating the proposition to create a new woman suffrage committee the Democrats had taken the position that women should not have an opportunity to be heard on the suffrage question.

"The gentleman knows," replied Representative Underwood, "that the Judiciary committee long has been vested with jurisdiction over this very question, and it has repeatedly granted hearings to women as to whether legislation shall be passed, submitting to the States a constitutional amendment for woman suffrage."

"Will the gentleman as leader of the majority," asked Mr. Lusk, "use his influence in the house for a report of that resolution so that we may have an opportunity here to vote on it?"

"I would not do so, because I am not in favor of it," replied Mr. Underwood. "If there is one fundamental principle that my party stands for, it is local self-government. If the Democratic party stands for one thing above all others, it is that the right of franchise should be governed by the States of the Union and not by the national government."

The resolution was defeated by a vote of 100 yeas, 90 nays.

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
