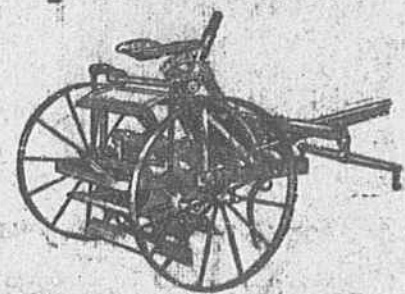

After camping a few days on the Congaree, on to Richmond was the order. By this time Grant was beginning his siege of Petersburg with Richmond in view as the place where he would succeed in winning his last and the south had worried the path in both Manassases.

Arriving at Richmond the Legion engaged in picket duty about fifteen miles below a place known as Deep Bottom and Double Gates. B. F. Burns was wounded at Deep Bottom.

lected, to be carried out primarily by the State college. The enforcement of sanitation and restrictive regulations by the State veterinarian. Active supervision by the bureau of animal industry of the department and the inoculation of diseased herds and exposed herds with the anti-hog cholera serum. A county in each State was selected as a unit and the method of work in that county was briefly for the State college to secure the cooperation of intelligent, active farmers in each township in the county. These men were called volunteer assistants and they were to keep in close communication with the department's inspector stationed in that area, keeping him informed of conditions and securing statistics concerning the hog industry. In this manner conditions were pretty well learned in the territory under inspection.
