Railroad Men to Be Welcomed by the Anderson Chamber of Commerce.

The regular monthly meeting of the directors of the Anderson Chamber of Commerce was held in the local chamber yesterday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock.

W. W. Sullivan was appointed as a special committee of one to welcome A. W. Anderson, general superintendent of the Charleston & Western Carolina Railroad.

At the meeting yesterday the board heard the report of the committee sent to Columbia in the interest of the bill giving the city of Anderson the right to assess abutting property for the purpose of permanent improvements.

The general railroad situation and the prospects for extension of several lines was discussed at length by the board, and it is hoped that it may be possible to get some immediate results from the efforts now being put forth.

Most of the members of the board, with one exception, were present, and the meeting yesterday was regarded as one of the best ever held by the directors of the Anderson Chamber of Commerce.
