GREAT DEMAND FOR THE NEW CIRCUIT

Greenville and Anderson People Say That Present Conditions Cannot Continue to Exist

Throughout Greenville and Anderson counties the general opinion prevails that the present conditions of this judicial circuit are such that the ends of the law are not being reached and that the work of the official bodies is being seriously hindered on account of the fact that many cases are never called on for trial. The following conditions from Greenville show that the situation is such that a new circuit is being demanded by the people of both counties.

Greenville county officials are delighted with the recent passage by the Senate of the bill providing for the 13th judicial circuit. A new circuit would mean the division of what is now known as the 12th judicial circuit, comprising Greenville, Anderson, Oconee and Pickens counties. The fight for the passage of the measure in the Senate was led by Senator William H. Harris, who based his argument upon the enormous amount of cases which accompany the term of court held either in Anderson or Greenville.

The bill is now before the House, where it is expected to meet strong opposition. Advocates of the measure, though, say the bill would be passed, and that the approval of the Governor.

Starting late as regards conditions arising from postponed trials in this county have come to light, and the general belief is that some action must necessarily be taken at an early date. Four persons or possibly more have died in the last two years in this county while awaiting trial. These were out on bond. It was learned yesterday that a resident of this county, out on bond awaiting a hearing of his case, was slowly dying of consumption. This man, it is said, had had his case postponed in two terms of court owing to the absence of the authorities to take the trial. During the recent term of court even the jail was not cleared, and as for hearing the case of a man out on bond, local officials say such a thing is almost unknown in this county.

It would be impossible to mention the number of cases pending in this county in the last term of court. The county clerk practices the policy of the year-around trial. The equal condition exists in Anderson County, according to reports from there, and the Anderson officials are agitating the movement for a new circuit with as much determination as the least authorities.

Other towns in which the court of this circuit sits experience no difficulty along this line, it is said, and for this reason they are making a strong fight against the change. According to the local authorities the town of Walhalla has each year a session of court lasting three weeks. This is adequate time in which to hear all cases arising in that section, and for this reason they see no need of revising the circuit. On the other hand Greenville county, with probably five times as many cases to be disposed of, only has a term of court lasting six weeks. A like term is held in Anderson county.

Hardly a case where bond had been granted was heard during the recent term of court in Greenville county, and even the attempt to clear the jails was a failure. Besides imposing a hardship upon the prisoners such conditions lessen the incentive of officers in enforcing the laws of the county, thus making conditions all the more deplorable. It is a well established fact that many defendants "beat the rap" to escape the consequences of their crimes. On the other hand many cases are compromised by the state in order to clear the dockets.

LOCAL CHURCHES ARE DOING MUCH

Official Data Compiled Following United Missionary Conference Which was Held Here

Following the United Missionary Campaign, which was held in Anderson recently, some interesting figures relative to the church work of Anderson, the contributions to missions, and other valuable statistics, have been compiled in card form.

This report shows that the First Baptist Church of Anderson heads the list in almost every particular. This church has a total membership of 1,126, makes an annual contribution to church expenses of \$1,734.83, makes an annual contribution to missions in America amounting to \$9,051.93, makes an annual contribution per member to missions of \$3.31 and averages weekly per member for the year of home night fund of \$1.25. This sum is \$1.25 more than the other churches of the city also make a splendid showing in relation to their membership, according to the official figures, although, when compared with the First Baptist Church, owing to the fact that they have nothing like as large membership.

OFFER SUBSTITUTE BILL ON PRIMARIES

Majority Report of Special Committee in Senate Comprises Measure in Lieu of That Introduced by Nicholson of Edgefield—Text of the Bill

Thursday there was reported to the Senate a primary reform bill drafted by a special committee of the upper house as a substitute for the measure introduced by B. E. Nicholson, senator from Edgefield. The bill submitted by the majority report of the special committee follows:

Section 1. That chapter 13 of volume 1, code of laws of South Carolina, 1912, relating to primary elections be amended by adding thereto additional sections to be known as sections 232a, 232b, 232c, 232d, 232e, 232f, 232g, 232h, and 232i. The additional sections to read as follows:

Section 232a. In each year before the first primary of any primary election held by any political party, organization or association for the purpose of choosing candidates for office, it shall be the duty of the members and officers of each club to provide for the enrollment, in alphabetical order of all persons who are entitled to vote at such club in the primary election of such political party, organization or association, as hereinafter provided. All persons who are qualified to vote in such primary elections under the constitution and rules of such political party, organization or association, and who are of the United States, and who have resided in the county 30 days, and of the township or ward 15 days, before the first primary election of such party, organization or association of any year in which an election shall be held on such club roll: Provided, That any person enrolled on any club roll shall be entitled to change his enrollment to any other club in the same ward or township upon applying in person to the club where he is enrolled at least 15 days before the first primary election and having his name taken from such club roll, and a statement applying to an officer of the club or to a town or ward officer, in said ward or township, and requesting that his name be stricken therefrom.

Section 232b. In each year, ten days before the first primary election of any political party, organization or association, it shall be the duty of the members and officers of the clubs or precincts of the clubs or precincts to make out a copy of the club roll of such club or precinct, and to certify under oath before a notary public, or other person authorized to administer oaths under the laws of this state, that the same is a true and correct copy of the club roll of such club, and shall file such certified copy with the clerk of court of the county in which such club or precinct is located, and the same shall be entered on record in his office.

Section 232c. No person shall be allowed to vote at any primary election whose name is not enrolled on the club roll of the club or precinct where he is entitled to vote under the constitution and rules of such political party, organization or association, in accordance with the provisions of this chapter, at least 15 days before the first primary election of such party, organization or association in each year in which an election shall be held.

Section 232d. In all political parties, organizations or associations in this state which cast 100,000 votes or more in its primary election the secretaries of the respective clubs, or precincts and the managers of election for all clubs or precincts shall receive compensation as follows: Each of such secretaries shall be paid the sum of \$1 for his services, and each manager shall be paid the sum of \$2 per day for each day that he shall act as such manager, the said amounts to be paid upon a certificate to be issued by the chairman of the county upon a warrant to be issued by the comptroller general upon the state treasurer, and to be paid out of any funds in the hands of the state treasurer not otherwise appropriated.

Section 232e. All persons enrolled at any club or precinct under the constitution and rules of such party, organization or association, and the provisions of this chapter, shall be entitled to vote at all of the primary elections of such party, organization or association upon presenting himself as the precinct or club at which he is enrolled and taking the oath and complying with the rules of such party, organization or association.

Section 232f. The representation of each of the clubs or precincts in the county conventions of each political party, organization or association shall be based upon the number of votes cast in the first primary election of the election next preceding the convention.

Section 232g. That an executive committee of every such political party, organization or association shall be provided for each party, organization or association of the state, to be composed of one member for each club or precinct, and a chairman to be elected under the constitution and rules of such party, organization or association; and it shall be the duty of such executive committee to meet at the court house in the respective counties ten days before the first primary in each election year. And the said committee shall have power to hear objections on the part of any persons to any club roll, and if there shall be found an error, to file the names of any persons not entitled to vote on any of the precincts, and if it shall be found that the names of any persons entitled to vote have been omitted, the said com-

FREIGHT WRECK ON THE BLUE RIDGE

They said, however, that only three passengers suffered little inconvenience, passengers' suitcases being inconvenient.

Consolidated train was cleared up last night by passengers' trains from Anderson to the wreck and then transferred to another train.
